Special Calf Sale To Be Held For 4-H

To aid 4-H dairy club and FFA members in obtaining good dairy stock for their projects, a special sale of purebred Guernsey calves and yearling heifers will take place at the State Fair grounds in Salem March 29 exclusively for these two groups.

Plans for the sale were drawn up in Corvallis by a committee from the Oregon Guernsey Cattle club meeting with representatives of the O.S.C. extension service and the state department of vocational education.

Animals to be sold will be selected from the purebred Guernsey herds of the state by a committee of breeders, representatives of the American Guernsey Cattle club, and a representative of the extension service. It is expected that from 30 to 50 head will be chosen.
