Civil Service Position Open

Federal Civil Service announces examinations for appointment to Telephone Operator and Telephone Supervisor positions in various Federal Government agencies in the states of Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and Washington. The entrance salaries for the Telephone Operator position range from \$1756 to \$2168, and for Telephone Supervisor from \$2394 to \$3021.

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced an examination for Engineer at the P-1 grade, \$2,644 a year, to fill vacancies in the Bureau of Reclamation throughout the following states: Oregon, Washington, California, Arizona, Nevada, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas. Full information and application forms may be secured from the Commission's local secretary, C. V. Smith, located at Coquille post office, from most first- or second-class post offices, from Civil Service Regional Offices, from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. Workers' Employment Claims Disqualified

Disqualifications involving 11832 workers' claims for periods of more than 35,000 weeks were imposed in 1946 by the adjustment unit of the Oregon Unemployment Compensation Commission, according to report by Administrator Silas Gaiser.

The unit examined 52,484 claims in making the disqualifications, the report revealed. Of the claims examined 12,814 were in the readjustment allowance division, which resulted in barring 940 veterans for periods of 2,602 weeks.

Of the worker disqualifications 1,150 were for voluntary quits, and 778 others involved suitable employment and discharge for misconduct.

Disqualifications for these reasons may be removed only after claimants earn \$50 in bona fide employment.

More than half of the barred claims had to do with being available for suitable employment but labor disputes resulted in the longest periods of disqualification, 17,721 weeks in all.

Changes in the unemployment law to provide flat periods of from four to eight weeks disqualification for voluntary quitting, discharge for misconduct and refusal of suitable employment have been proposed to the 1947 legislature by the commission. The proposals would replace the present provision of two weeks of subsequent employment, which has proven extremely difficult to administer, the commission said.

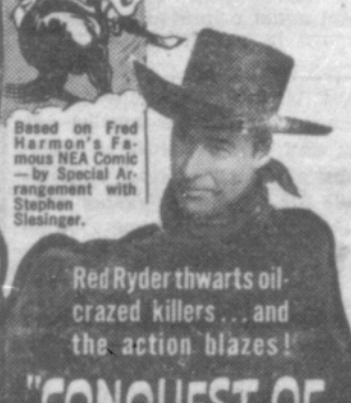
