Our teacher, Mrs. Mackey, attended the Business and Professional Women's conference held in Coquille last Sunday.

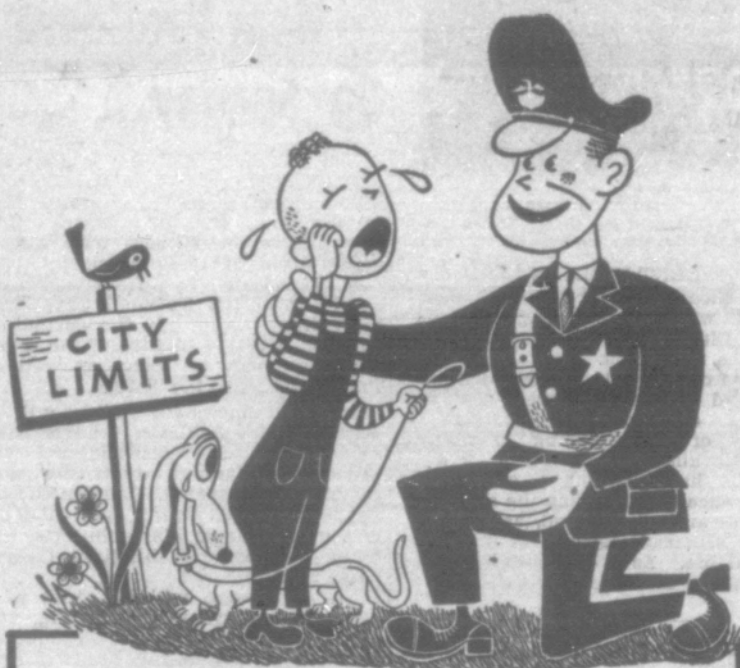
We are planning on having a moving picture program at our school as soon as a picture can be arranged for.
