

School Board Gives Teaching Staff \$500.00 Raise

A raise straight across the boards of \$500.00 annually was given the teachers of the Coquille public school system at the regular meeting of the Coquille school board Wednesday night.

This makes the Coquille teachers among the highest paid teachers in the state and places them well above the proposed state minimum of \$2400

per year.

The average Washington grammar school teacher will earn around \$2660 per year, while the lowest high school salary will be \$2890 per year.

Adjustments were also made in administrative salaries. No action was taken on raises for other employees, but substantial raises will be

given them, too, it is expected.

The budget committee met with the school board and approved the action of the board.

At a meeting of teachers earlier this month, a poll was taken showing that they wanted a raise similar to the one offered them.

Contracts must be issued all teachers by Saturday, March 15th, according to Oregon School Law.

Thoughtless Parents Hit In Talk

The inter-church fellowship dinner Tuesday night's panel discussion on "Helping Youth Face Life" drew forth remarks aimed at thoughtless parents by James Leonard, Coos county juvenile officer. Leonard scored parents who fail to spend time with their children and to put thought on their guidance.

He pointed out that in February his office investigated a record number of new juvenile cases—66 in all.

Moderator was the Rev. O. W. Payne of Coos Bay. He stressed as basic needs for young people: self-understanding, vital Christian faith, Christian sex education, Christian social education, and membership in a Christian fellowship.

Carl Morrison, city superintendent of schools, discussed "The influence of the school on young people," and Mrs. Martha Mulkey Purdy spoke on "The influence of the Church on young people."

Immunization Dates Set For Local Schools

Dates for immunization and tuberculin testing have been set for the Coquille schools, Dr. Eleanor B. Gutman, Coos county health officer, stated today.

Combined immunization and tuberculin testing will be held March 31st at the high school and junior high school. On April 18th the diphtheria, smallpox and tuberculin testing will be conducted at the Washington grade school.

At the high school only tuberculin testing is planned unless individuals request the smallpox vaccination. It is felt that most of the high school and junior high school age group were vaccinated last year in the mass vaccinations of that time.

Eight gasoline companies placed their bids to supply 100,000 gallons more or less for a year, beginning the latter part of March.
