Two Large Barrels Shoes Sent Overseas

The April shipment of clothing for overseas relief included two large barrels of shoes—ninety-nine pairs—

and two barrels of bedding and clothing. The shoes were sent to the warehouse in New York where they will be incorporated in a ten ton lot for immediate shipment to Europe. Each garment sent to the San Francisco warehouse will be processed and packed in a moth-proof bag since most of these garments were woolens and so made ready for safe delivery overseas.

In addition to these barrels which are sent by freight, twenty-two packages were sent by mail this year to individuals, nine of these containing food and the remainder clothes.

The need is very great and this work will be continued by the Adventist Dorcas Society.
