Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Myers of Myrtle Point were Sunday evening guests at the home of his mother, Ida Myers.

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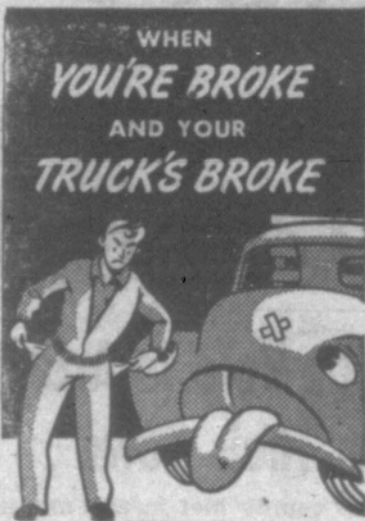
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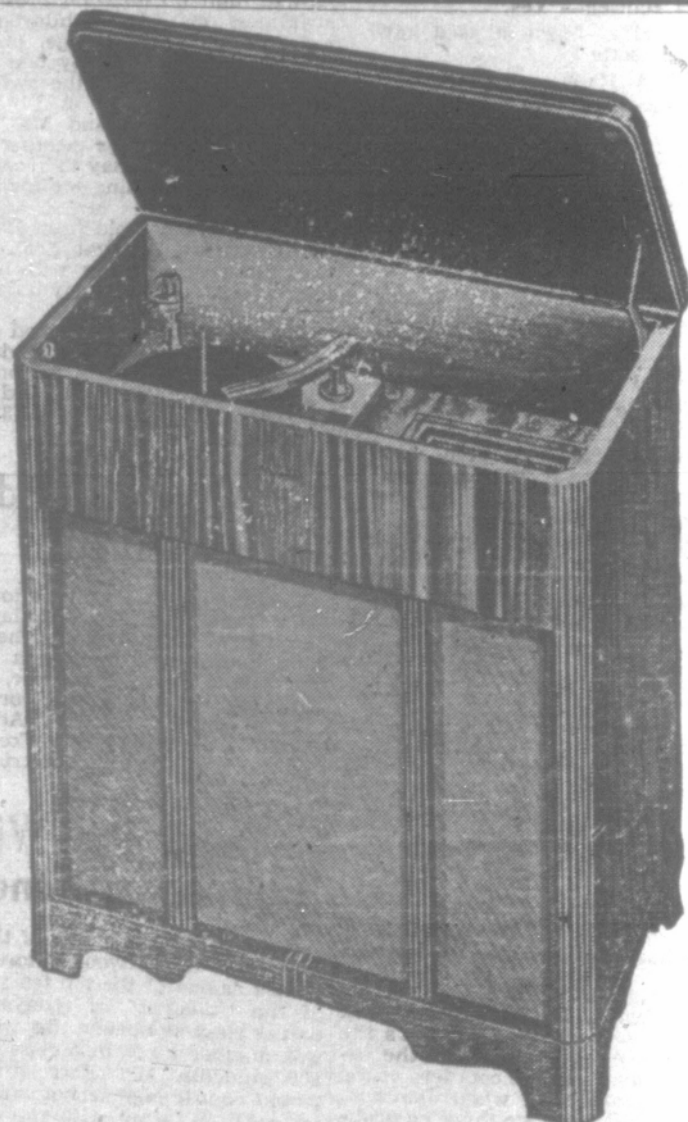
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
