Stem Active In Convention

Dr. C. S. Stem of Coquille took an active part in the annual three-day convention of the Oregon Association of Chiropractic Physicians at the Multnomah hotel in June.

The Council office in Eugene indicates that his successor will be appointed in the next few weeks and that present plans call for dividing the area, formerly covered by Seaton, in early 1948, and bringing in the fifth member of the staff thereby making available a field executive for service in Coos and Curry counties with offices in Coos Bay and a staff in Douglas county with headquarters in Roseburg.

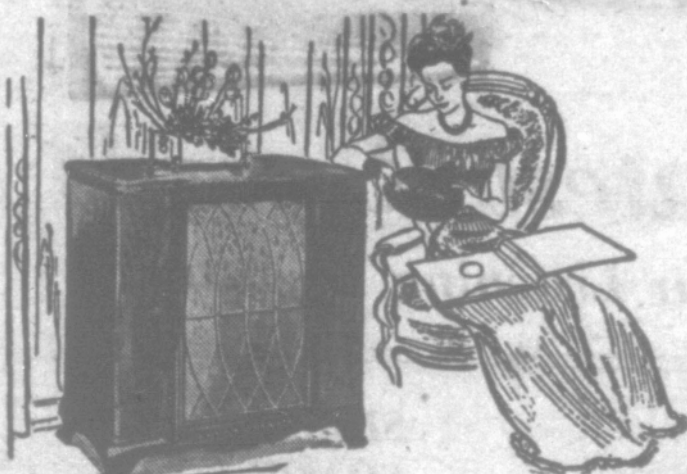
