

Girl Scout Camp Visitors Given Program By Campers Friday Afternoon

Visitors at Coquille's Girl Scout Day Camp were honored with a program last Friday at 2:00 p. m. during the closing hour of the five-day camp held in Patterson grove.

Unit by unit through ages 7 to 16, the girls and their leaders presented a varied entertainment. The entire camp sang "Girl Scouts Together," then the youngest campers who had chosen the name, "Tiny Tunes," sang a number of short songs, including "We're the Brownies," "Row, Row Your Boat," and "I've Something in My Pocket." Camp Evergreen girls, age nine years, danced "Jennie Crack Corn," an old American singing game. The "Elephant Dance," with participants wearing realistic masks was offered by the ten-year old "Flying Saucers."

"Dulcimas Machoes" (sweet mules), presented two skits. One was entitled, "Safety First," the other was the "Donkey Song," to illustrate their unit name. A diary of day camp was read by girls of the 12-year old "Patterson Pals" unit and each girl was awarded a leaf-medal by the counselor for some outstanding feat as a day camper.

A skit called "The Peanut," was presented by girls from Scout Paradise unit and two of the girls danced "Comin' Thru the Tye," as the others sang the accompaniment.

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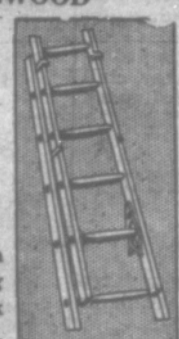
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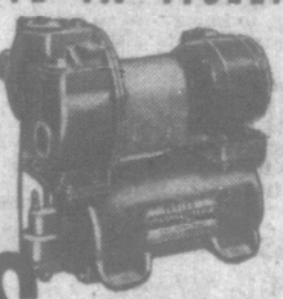
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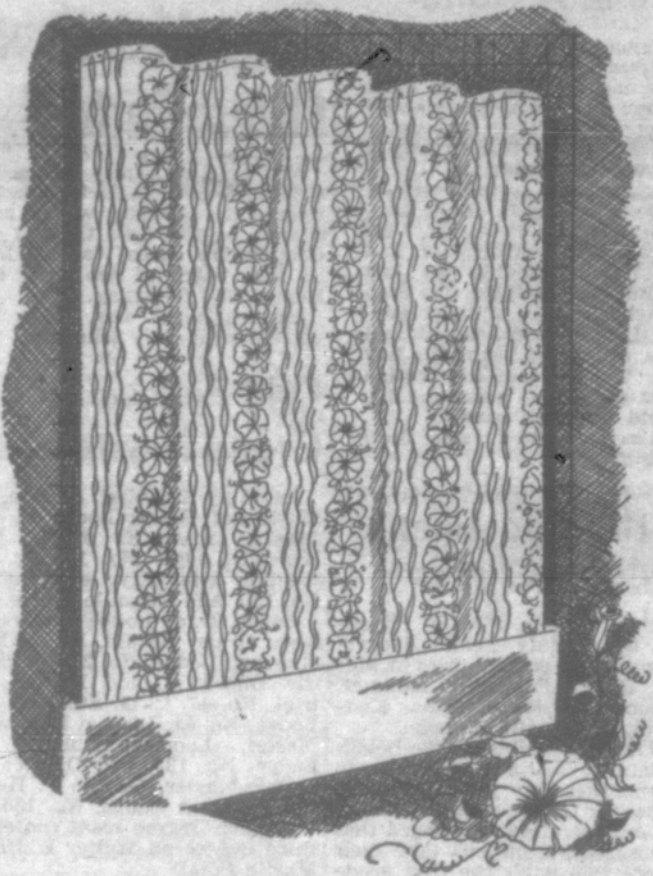
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
