G. M. Product Prices Hiked

Detroit, Aug. 7.—General Motors corporation hiked prices two to six per cent last Friday on its five lines of automobiles and on one line of trucks.

G. M. President C. E. Wilson said the company raised prices "reluctantly" but was forced to do so by increased material and labor costs since last November when G. M. kicked each car up \$100.

The increase covered all Cadillac, Buick, Oldsmobile, Pontiac and Chevrolet cars and Chevrolet trucks. The G. M. C. truck and coach division made hikes last Thursday of \$17 to \$182.

Wilson said prices of G. M.'s non-automotive products, such as refrigerators, also would be raised similarly, but there would be no changes in auto service parts.

He referred to G. M.'s 1947 six-month earnings, totaling some \$147,622,000 or \$3.20 per common share, as reasonably satisfactory but said the profit reflected liquidation of lower priced materials.

Including manufacturers, distributors, dealers and buyers, more than 4000 people are expected to attend the three-day combined furniture market and convention.

Lynch, president of the Northwest Furniture Manufacturers' association, a sellout of the nearly 100,000 square feet of display space in the Seattle Civic Auditorium and Ice Arena has been obtained—an indication that large stock of the latest offerings of furniture and home furnishing manufacturers will be shown.

The annual meeting of the Retail Furniture association of Washington will be held at the New Washington Hotel in Seattle, Wednesday, August 13, climaxed by a general session and banquet, to which all dealers from the Northwest states are invited. Featured speaker at this banquet will be Dr. Henry A. Burd, professor of marketing and advertising at the University of Washington. His subject will be "A Marketer Looks at Inventories." Dr. Burd is widely known throughout the West, having conducted numerous marketing and advertising clinics for retail merchants and trade associations in many areas of this region during past years. A golf tournament is planned for those manufacturers, distributors and dealers who will stay over Friday, August 15.

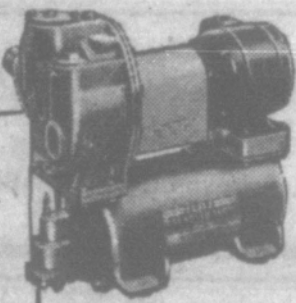
