Langlois Man Named Director Of North American Lily Society This Month

Langlois is feeling pretty proud this month with the recognition it has received nationally and internationally as one of the great centers of lily culture, for it had one of its leading bulb growers and hybridizers named a director on the recently formed North American Lily Society. One of a board of nine directors from the United States and Canada is Donald Stryker of Langlois, Oregon, who will serve for the coming year.

Mr. Stryker who holds a degree from the School of Landscape Architecture of Harvard university has long been recognized as a leader in the field of lily culture. He has had unusual success in his work, and has one of the most complete plantings of the various leading lilies in existence.

He will leave Saturday of this week for an extended tour throughout the South where he will appear before various garden clubs. Next week he is slated to talk before the Los Angeles Garden club which numbers over 2,000 members on its roster.

The North American Lily Society was organized in the Horticultural Hall of Boston, Mass., to promote lily culture. It is a member of the American Horticultural Society of Washington, D. C. This society has been publishing the American Lily yearbook for four years, and has sponsored research work with lilies for the past eight years.

The new society is open to any person interested in promoting the culture of lilies, and is country-wide in scope with members belonging from Canada and the United States.

Officers of the new society are Dr. L. H. MacDaniels, Cornell university, president; Dr. E. F. Palmer, Director Horticultural Experiment Station, Ontario, Canada, vice-president; Dr. Norma Pfeiffer, Boyce Thompson Institute, New York, secretary; and Dr. Philip Eriery, Plant Industry Experiment station, Beltsville, Md., treasurer.

Xmas Committee To Spend \$300

Three hundred dollars was allotted to the committee in charge of the Christmas decorations, under the direction of Bill Head, at the regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce held in the Coquille Hotel on Tuesday noon of this week.

Head reported that the committee suggested at their meeting that some type of permanent decorations be secured to replace the Christmas trees used in previous years. The directors of the Chamber gave the committee the power to act on the suggestion.

Ted Foss, who has just opened a sporting goods store, was introduced to the members as a new member to the chamber. Rev. Earl Soward and Rev. Lawrence Guderian were introduced as guests at the meeting. J. L. Smith, County Agent George Jenkins, and Ed Hughes each gave a short report on the coming Coos County fair. The fair board decided that Thursday, September 11, be designated as Coquille Day at the fair. In the past, this day has always been on Friday, and therefore the directors asked the Retail Trades committee to contact merchants about closing on Thursday as they have closed in the past.

President Evan Albom submitted a suggestion from the Active club, concerning the Fall Opening scheduled for September 20. The suggestion was for the Active club to hold a local "Talent Show" on the evening of the Opening at the Community building as an added attraction for the occasion. The directors unanimously approved the plan and the club was given the "go-ahead" signal. The money raised from this event will go into a fund for a permanent playground, complete with equipment, to be installed behind the Community building.

Rev. Robert Greene commented on the coming Community Chest drive and stated that it might be a good idea to incorporate a local Community Chest drive along with the county-wide program.

Farm Cooperative Men Hear Reports

Representatives from the various farmers' cooperative organizations of Coos county met Tuesday night in the county agent's office to hear the report from a group of men who last week visited co-ops in other parts of the state.

Reporting on their visits in Monmouth, Hillsboro, Portland, Battleground, Astoria and Tillamook were the following men: Ray Rickman, manager of the Coquille Valley Dairy cooperative, Bandon; W. E. Cross, a director of the Coos-Curry Feed co-op; E. W. Messenger, assistant manager of the Grange Supply Co., Coos Bay, and George Jenkins, county agent.

The purpose of the trip had been to gather information as to: (a) the type of organization used successfully and (b) methods of operating plants. Specifically, the Coos county men sought to find out whether the co-ops of the county should attempt to organize a milling plant for preparing dairy and poultry feeds or whether they could better obtain the mixed feeds from an established co-op.

The opinion of the group was, after all the reports were heard, that it would be best to try to affiliate with the Pacific Co-op Poultry Producers, Portland, whose large Eugene plant is nearing completion.

Each existing co-op in the county is to consider what type of county organization they prefer, it was decided. Attending the meeting were representatives from Arago Co-op Cheese association, Coos-Curry Feed Co-op, Coos County Livestock Marketing association. Working with the others and attending the meetings are men from Coos Bay Mutual Creamery, the Coos Grange Supply Co-op, and the Coos River Farmers' Co-op.

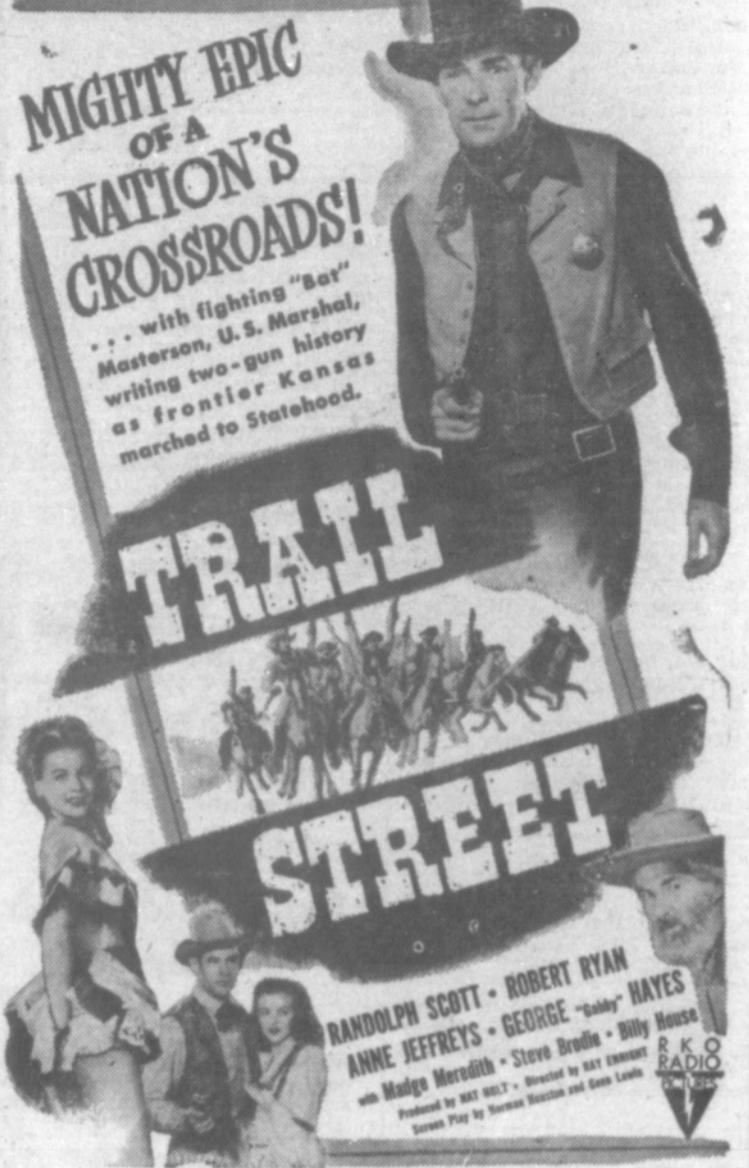
