New Man Takes Over Ideal Bakery

One of the newest business men in town is Clovis Brant who just recently purchased a half interest in the Ideal Bakery formerly owned by Gus Gallas and Lincoln Beale. Mr. Beale retained his interest in the Bakery.

Brant is a former resident of Coquille, spending his early school years here. He then moved to North Bend and finished his schooling there. Two Horses Killed Friday Night

Two horses were killed instantly when a car driven by Jack Hall collided with them about three miles south of Coquille on the Myrtle Point highway Friday night at 8:45.

Blinded by the oncoming headlights, Hall did not see the team of horses owned by Rufus Rylander. Although driving only 40 miles an hour, it was impossible for him to stop before hitting the horses. A moderate amount of damage was done to the front grill and radiator of the car.

Vet Re-Adjustment Allowances Dated

Termination date of the war under the Federal-State program of readjustment allowances for unemployed and self-employed veterans has been set as July 25, 1947, according to word received by Silas Gaiser, administrator for the Oregon Unemployment Compensation commission.

"This means that World War II veterans discharged before July 26, 1947, will have until July 25, 1949, to draw their allowances if eligible," explained Mr. Gaiser. "Those discharged since July 26 last will have two years from date of leaving the service."

Congressional action on substituting the new date for "termination of the war" in Title V of the G-I Bill of Rights came during the closing days of the 1947 session. State agencies have been administering the readjustment allowance program on the same basis as unemployment compensation under state laws.

With many veterans now having benefit rights under both state and federal plans, Mr. Gaiser pointed out the importance of considering expiration dates in filing claims. Both types of claims are handled through the Oregon Commission's 29 local employment offices, where all information concerning weekly allowances, duration and expiration rights may be secured.

Since the G-I bill went into effect three years ago, about 72,000 veterans or nearly half of those returning to Oregon have filed claims. Of the 1,658 who have exhausted their allowances, 818 were self-employed. Oregon veterans have received nearly \$17 millions, of which 19 per cent has gone to those working for themselves.
