Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Zeigler, Sr., returned Thursday, Aug. 14th, from a very lovely and interesting trip back east.

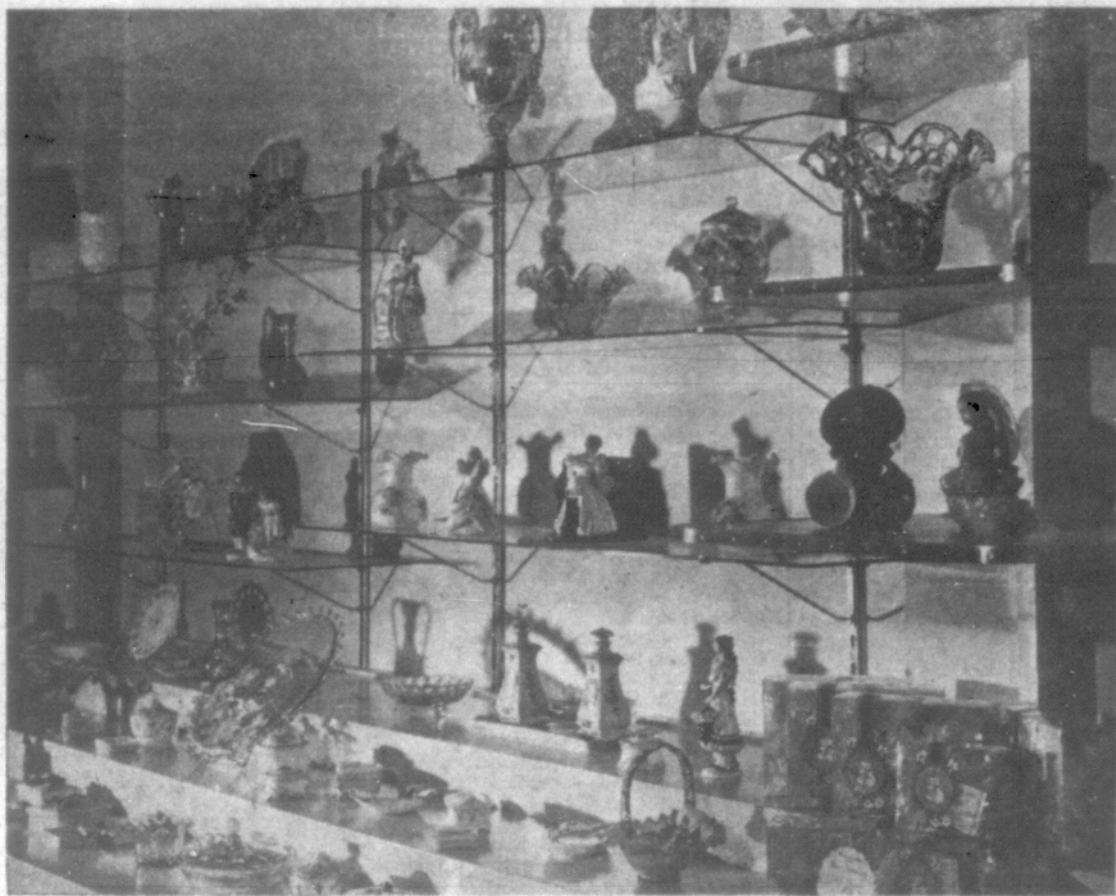
Mr. and Mrs. George Glenn have left on a trip and will be gone for a month. When asked where they were going, they replied, "We'll tell you when we return."

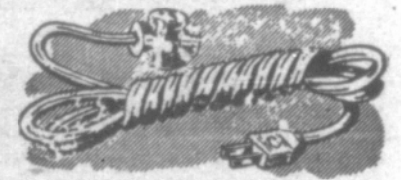

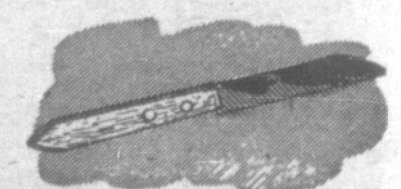
