Sales Tax Benefits Poor Man, Says Representative Ralph Moore Wednesday

"It's really the poor man who stands to benefit from the sales tax," said Rep. Ralph Moore, Coos Bay, before a group of Rotarians Wednesday noon in the Hotel Coquille. "For the so-called wage-earner and poor man, is one of the highest income taxpayers in the state of Oregon," Moore said.

Mr. Moore who is one of the supporters of the sales tax bill which will be voted on by the electorate in October, said costs of the state are steadily increasing, and that new buildings needed, new employees, and the new costs added by the 40-hour working week, is placing Oregon in a financial mess.

Moore said it has been the history of Oregon voters that they refused to pass tax measures until they were able to see the need for them. He cited various times different bills were presented to the people before they approved them.

"More population," Moore said, "has brought increasing costs of government, which means that new revenues must come from some place. He cited the fact that if the sales tax is not passed there will be a higher income tax and a higher property levy next year.

Moore also announced that he will attempt to call a meeting of the highway interim committee for Coquille at which Moore hopes to get a backing of one road from the interior to the coast.

Recent feeling in Coquille over well-founded reports that a highway was being pushed for direct entrance into Coos Bay, "by-passing Myrtle Point and Coquille, might impede the highway program, Moore said.

Active Club Slates Anniversary Party

A dinner and dancing party will be held in the Club Midway this Saturday night in honor of the first anniversary of the chartering of the Coquille Active Club. The local young men's organization was chartered last August 17.

While still in its infancy the club has an enviable list of completed projects, the major part of which have been in favor of the children of the community. Starting out before even being a chartered club, the group took the first prize last year in the men's division of the Fourth of July floats, immediately after receiving its charter a county-wide amateur boxing tournament was held, with the proceeds being spent for gymnasium equipment for the use of the youngsters in Coquille. The latest project to be completed was a swimming program for children to receive free instructions from the Red Cross with nearly one-hundred children taking advantage of it. The club also has just finished erecting a steel net on the tennis courts in the baseball park, with funds furnished by the city park commission. Future plans include a fund to set aside money for a permanent playground, complete with latest equipment, and probably a small wading pool.

A large attendance of members and guests are expected to attend this annual affair of the organization.
