4-H Judging Contests Sunday

Demonstration and judging contests, a style revue and the judging of exhibits will be the main events of the Annual Coos County 4-H Achievement Day Sunday, August 24, according to Noel Sommer, assistant county agent. The program will commence at 1:30 p. m. in the Coquille high school. Contestants will be selected to represent Coos county at the Oregon State fair September 1 to 7. Winning demonstration teams will be selected in each of the following divisions: dairy, livestock, poultry, crops, food preservation, cookery, clothing, homemaking and miscellaneous. Individual contestants will be selected in bread baking and dollar dinner contests and a style revue. The best exhibits in all projects excepting livestock will be selected and shipped to Salem for exhibition. The champion agriculture and home economics demonstration teams and a livestock judging team will receive a free trip to compete at the state fair sponsored by the four Co-op creameries in the county. Arrangements are being made for a number of additional contestants to attend the fair at small cost. Ted Kirsch, Myrtle Point farmer and formerly agriculture teacher at the Myrtle Point union high school, will judge all agriculture events. Mrs. Lois Lutz Brundage will judge the home economics work.

4-H Tour Starts Tomorrow

The South Coast 4-H livestock and crops tour will begin at the Dr. J. H. Bennett hog farm, five miles south of Coos Bay, at 9:00 a. m., Friday, August 22, according to Noel Sommer, assistant county agent. Formerly an annual event, the tour will be held this year for the first time since the war. Club members from Douglas, Curry and Coos counties are planning to participate. The tour is being conducted by Cal Monroe, assistant state 4-H club leader, assisted by R. M. Knox, Curry county agent, Kenneth Minnick, Douglas county club agent, and Noel Sommer, Coos county, assistant county agent.

Heavy Expenditures Foreseen In County For New Farm Homes

Farm families in Coos county will spend more than \$1,035,000 for new housing in the next three to five years, according to a forecast released by the Title Council of America. "As a result of high incomes during the last few years, farmers in every part of the nation are prepared to invest record amounts in new home construction and in general farm improvements," said F. B. Ortman, chairman of the Council's residential construction committee. Pointing out that the comforts and conveniences of urban living are now available to farm families, Ortman said that new rural homes will incorporate such features as central heating, tiled bathrooms and modern kitchen facilities. Availability of electricity in rural areas of Oregon is making possible the incorporation in new homes of many labor-saving and comfort-providing devices undreamed of a generation ago, according to Ortman. Rural Electrification Administration estimates disclosure that more than 82 per cent of all farms in the state now receive central station electric service. Refrigerators, electric washing machines and deep-freezing plants, as well as plumbing systems, will go into many new homes as a consequence.

The regular weekly test for bacterial content on Coquille's drinking water conducted by the state board of health laboratory in Portland gave the drinking fluid an okeh for purity, according to John Ellertson, city manager. Test samples of water are taken weekly and sent to Portland for the checking. According to Ellertson there has been a report that the water is not pure, and this is unfounded as brought out by the state tests.

94 Teachers Take Driving School

Ninety-four teachers from Oregon, Washington, California and Montana high schools registered in the first teacher-training class in high school driver education and training, held in Portland Aug. 11-15, under the auspices of the state system of higher education, according to the Oregon State Motor association.

The class is under the direction of Prof. Bob Glenn, of Oregon State college, as course director, while instruction is given by Prof. Amos Neyhart, driver training consultant for the AAA.

The Oregon course is the largest teacher training class including lecture and road training ever to be held in this country under AAA supervision, Ray Conway, manager of the Oregon motor club said. Instruction and material for the course is provided through the Oregon Association, affiliate of the national American Automobile Association.

A new Pontiac dual control driver training car has been assigned to the Oregon State Motor Association for use in the teacher training class. This car will later be assigned to Battle-ground, Washington, high school. Any Oregon high school that qualifies under AAA requirements may apply for a free, brand new dual control car made available through the Pontiac and Chevrolet divisions of General Motors.

Oregon communities represented in the teacher training class in Portland are Astoria, Sweet Home, Lakeview, Bend, Odell, Donald, Sherwood, Salem, Mt. Vernon, West Linn, Park-rose, Cascade Locks, St. Helens, Cottage Grove, Milton, Hillsboro, Newberg, Roseburg, Eugene, Prineville, Klamath Falls, Vernonia, Rainier, Hood River, Grants Pass, Woodburn, LaGrande, Gresham, Tillamook, Forest Grove, Banks, Tigard, Clatskanie, Oregon City, Sandy, Pendleton, Myrtle Creek, Springfield, The Dalles, Rogue River and Portland.

Washington communities are Pleasant Valley, Camas, Battle-ground, Montesano, Kalama and Vancouver. California communities are Oakdale, Chico and Lynwood and the Montana representative comes from Whitewater.

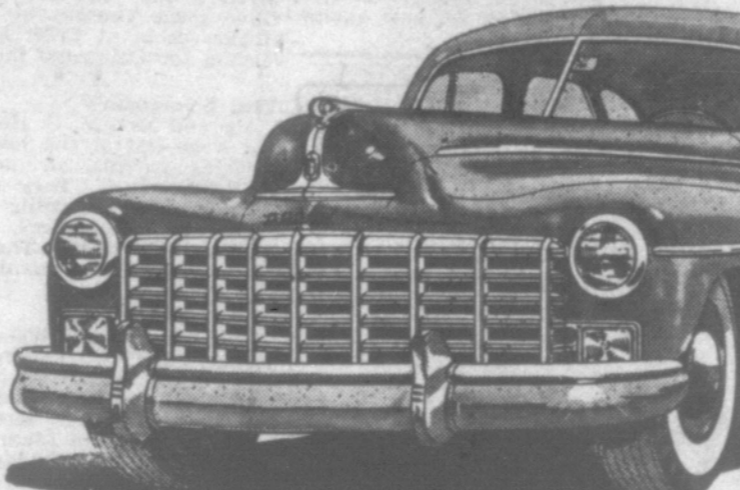
