OSC Prepares For Freshman Class

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Aug. 23—With the end of the post summer session, August 29, interest is centered on opening of the 24th annual freshman week which starts Monday, September 15 and continues through Saturday.

New students accepted a month before the opening of freshman week totaled 2472, including both new freshmen and transfers. This is practically the same number accepted at that date a year earlier. The final number of new students accepted last year was 2663 freshmen and 534 transfers.

More than 1100 students who applied for admission this year have not been accepted, Dr. D. T. Orde-man, registrar, reports. Of these 779 failed to follow up their application when requirements were explained, and 328 were rejected when credentials failed to meet entrance requirements. An uncounted additional number who inquired personally at the office about admission were advised not to apply when found not qualified.

The freshman week program will begin with an assembly at 8 o'clock Monday morning and will continue much as usual through the week with placement examinations and assemblies. One big change is in registration procedure.

Old students and new together will begin registration Wednesday under an alphabetical division arrived at by drawing letters out of a hat. Approximately a fourth of the students will be registered each day through Saturday. This plan, tried in spring term registration, avoided long lines and crowding.

Chain Stores May Sell Easter Lilies

Mass marketing of Easter lily bulbs through chain stores may help solve the problem of this year's surplus production of bulbs in western Oregon, reports J. C. Moore, assistant extension marketing economist at O.S.C. Moore has been working with a special marketing committee of the Pacific Bulb Growers association which has requested the Oregon Chain Store association to help market the surplus.

Under the plan proposed, medium sized bulbs suitable for gardens or house plants would be offered to the public at popular prices. The industry estimates the surplus above normal trade demands may amount to more than 18 million bulbs this year.
