Club Women Hear State President Tell Plans For National Convention In Oregon

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Delegates from Coquille, Corvallis, Roseburg, Coos Bay, North Bend, Albany, and Myrtle Point attended the annual fall meeting of district No. 2 of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs held in Coquille on Friday, November 7, to hear Mrs. William B. Chand-lee, state president, of Portland, speak on plans for the coming National convention to be held in Portland in May, 1948.

Mrs. Chandlee said that Oregon was greatly honored to be the chosen meeting place for the General Federation of Women's Clubs in 1948. She pointed out that women from all over the United States would be in Portland for the meeting and a foreign delegation from European countries was also expected.

The reputation of Oregon would be at stake, the state president continued, and she urged every woman to get behind the effort to make the convention an outstanding success. She went on to outline plans for the entertainment of the delegates which had already been drawn up.

The annual state convention would be held in conjunction with the national meeting, it was explained. Mrs. Chandlee said that at that time her term of office would expire and she took the opportunity to tell the ladies how much she had enjoyed her work as state president. She felt that her life had been enriched by the friendships she had made.

The women were asked to choose a flower and a color, emblematic of district No. 2, to be used in decorating the district's table for the territorial dinner to be held on the Friday evening of the national gathering. After some deliberation the rhododendron was chosen as the flower, and "myrtlewood" brown as the color.

During the morning session district officers were elected as follows for a two year term: first vice president, Mrs. Carl Sutton, Corvallis; second vice president, Mrs. E. L.
