Credit Granters Institute

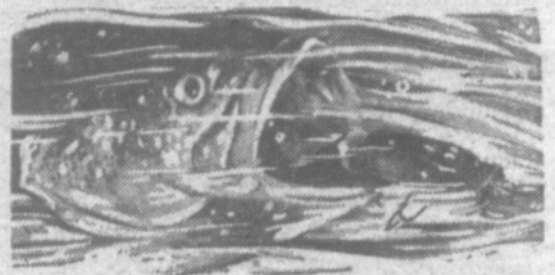

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Creel Census Taken In Lake

During the first 37 days of the 1947 angling season at Fish Lake, in the upper South Umpqua river drainage, Rose C. Hodgkinson of Milo, Oregon, temporary forest guard, checked anglers who made 788 trips on the lake, spending 2,467 hours to catch 3,586 fish, the Game Commission reports. This was an average of 1.45 fish per hour. Such a rate of catch is remarkably high, although the study covered only the early part of the season which is invariably better than the late summer months. Rainbow comprised 71.5 per cent of the catch while the remainder were eastern brook trout. A significant indication that the lake is in an excellent state of productivity was the fact that 35.4 per cent of the catch were in the ten to twelve inch size group.

The analysis of the catch was made in an attempt to obtain basic, measured information which can be compared with similar data secured during succeeding years. It can then be ascertained if the lake production is changing appreciably or if alleged decreasing returns to the creel are only the result of increasing angling pressure.

The Fish Lake study was set up and carried out with the cooperation of John R. Montgomery, Umpqua National Forest district ranger.
