Right off the bat we wish to make a correction regarding a statement made in this column which has 'roused the wrath of many anglers. The statement in question was made a few issues back, and we assure you that it is not what it seemed, or appeared to be.

What we have reference to is regarding our stand on the poison bait question that was brought up before the meeting at Roseburg last month. We stated that we took a decided stand and howled long and loud against the use of poison bait in southwestern Oregon. Well, Brother Sportsmen, we are for bait in any form, for general use in the taking of game fish. It is every man to his choice. Personally, we prefer flies, but do not hesitate to use any other lure or bait at any time the fish are taking any particular spinner or bait. We trust that we have vindicated ourself on the above for all time.

Have you noticed the migration during the past month of caterpillars? We mean the fuzzy little fellows, not the gas propelled "cat" of the farms and highways.

For many days now those little fellows have been crossing the highway. They are not crossing in any given district, but over a large area consisting of several hundred miles. And if you are a close observer you have no doubt noticed that 99 out of every hundred of them are heading north. Just an occasional one is heading in any other direction, he no doubt becoming woozy from too much nectar absorbed from the leaves of the last tree he has visited.

Hundreds of thousands of these little fuzzy, hairy like larva of lepidopterous insects, or butterflies, start on a pilgrimage that takes them northward.
