126 TONS OF FISH RELEASED IN 1947

Fish releases by the Oregon State Game Commission for the 1947 season totaled 126,379,614 fish or 251,512 pounds. While this exceeds the 1946 liberations by only 1,000,000 fish in actual numbers, the increase in total poundage runs close to 75 per cent as the total weight for fish released in 1946 was about 144,000 pounds. To carry on this fish production program in 1947, the hatchery department used 2,250,000 pounds of fish food at a cost of \$184,000.

Bulk of the releases were rainbow trout of which there were 11,769,000. Other species in the order of numbers planted included steelheads, cutthroats, eastern brook, silversides, chinooks, yanks and chums.
