Any further returns will quickly be converted into community health benefits."

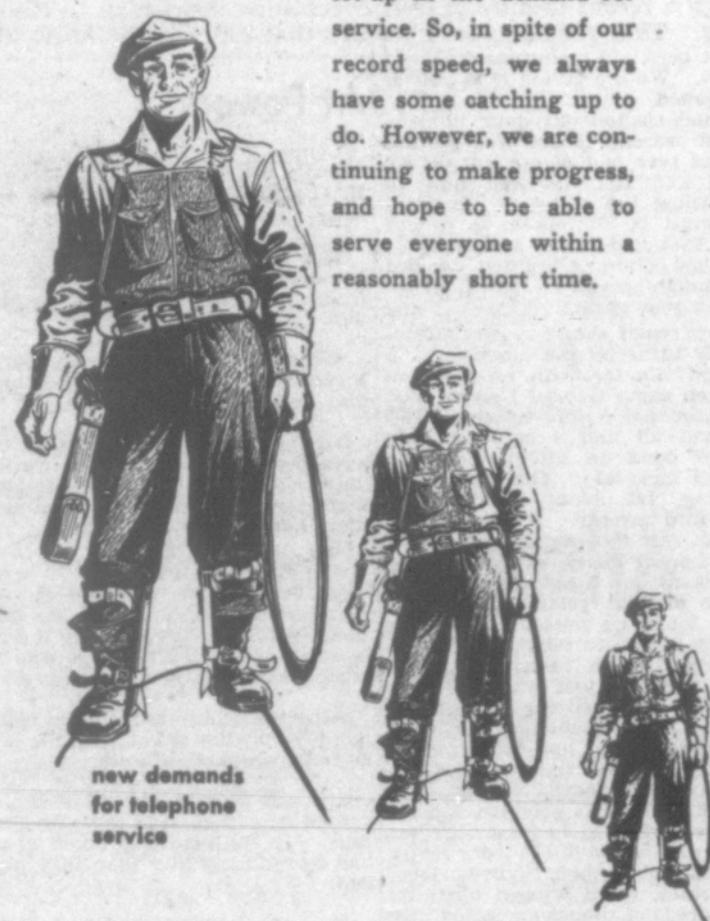

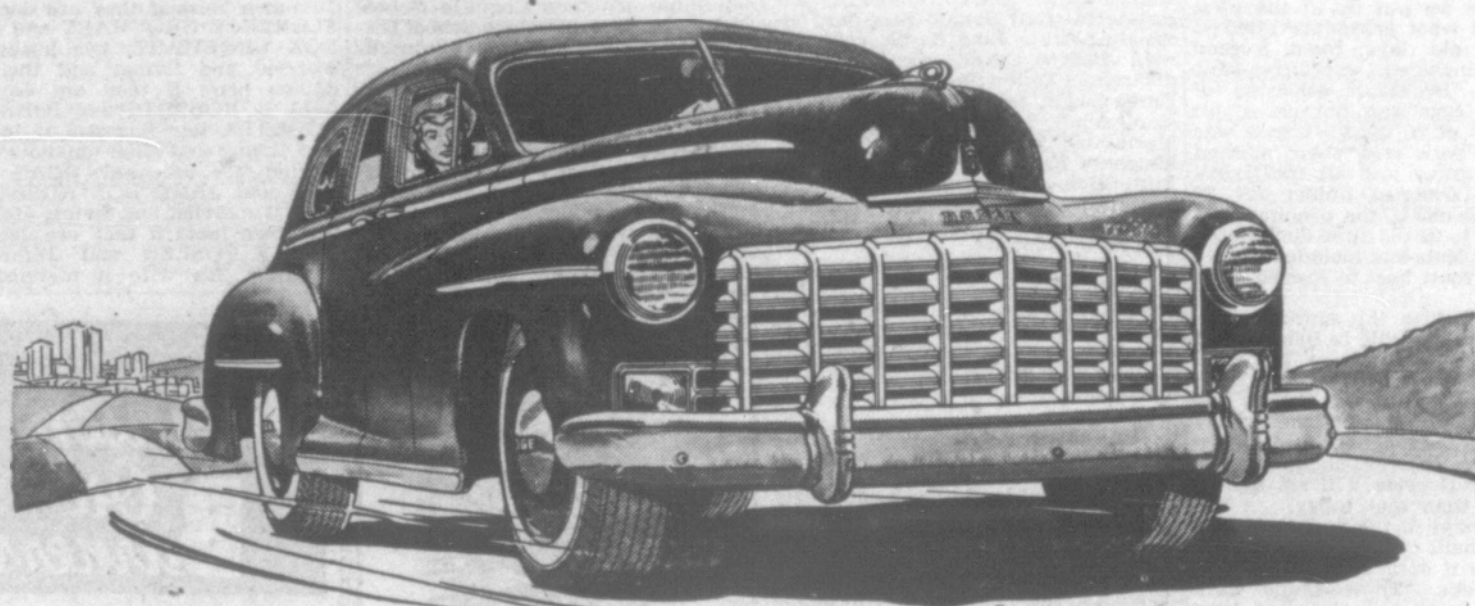
