### Guides To Be Regulated

Stricter regulations governing the issuance of angling and hunting guide licenses will be enforced beginning February 1 as a result of action taken by the Game commission at its last meeting. G. A. Lockwood, state game supervisor, announces.

Not only will applicants for guides have to comply with certain minimum requirements but it will also be necessary for them to pass a written examination given by Game Commission agents in the field before a license will be issued.

The last legislature granted the Commission additional discretionary power in the issuance of guide licenses and also increased the license fee from \$3 to \$15.

## Chevrolet Hits Production High

DETROIT—Production of passenger cars and trucks by the Chevrolet Motor Division during December set a new postwar high, when a total of 110,049 units were made in the company's assembly plants. It was announced today by Nicholas Dreystadt, Chevrolet general manager.

The total of 38,160 trucks and commercial vehicles produced during December not only was a new postwar record, Dreystadt pointed out, but also came within 736 units of setting an all-time high mark for this type of production. Chevrolet produced more trucks and commercial units last month than in any single month since June, 1929, when 38,896 such units were made.

The production of 71,889 passenger cars in December also was a new postwar record, exceeding any production month since the resumption of automobile making following V-J Day. It was higher than any passenger car production month since December 1941.

Shortly before the end of the year, Chevrolet announced it was the first single company to make more than a million passenger cars and trucks in 1947. The year-end production figures show that a total of 1,031,330 passenger and commercial vehicles were manufactured in Chevrolet assembly plants.

### Veronica Lake, Joel McCrea Star in 'Ramrod,' Thur.-Sat.

"Ramrod," a dramatic epic produced by the new Enterprise Productions, Inc., is scheduled to be shown Thursday, Friday and Saturday at the Roxy theatre.

A dramatization of Luke Short's popular novel and Saturday Evening Post serial, the picture co-stars Joel McCrea and Veronica Lake in this story of a domineering girl who attempts, by guile and wiles, to beat the men at their own game. McCrea is her unaware confederate in the part of the "ramrod" or rapch foreman on her cattle ranch and Arleen Whelan portrays Veronica's rival for McCrea's heart.

Don DeFore is cast as McCrea's right hand man and Preston Foster is the "heavy." As Veronica's hard-bitten, ruthless father, Charlie forsakes comedy for drama. Donald Crisp enacts the sheriff.

"Ramrod," a United Artists release, is set against a background of the early 1870's. Filmed in Zion National Park, Utah, it was directed by Andre de Toth.

## Writer Says Water Still Coming Down

The Editor:

According to a statement in last week's Sentinel our sewer that was installed in 1947 worked so efficiently that no damage was done by the last bad storm.

Did you, Mr. Editor, or anyone reading this article, happen to go by the Cox Apartments during the storm? If you did, you could plainly see the damage done by the "efficient" \$15,000 sewer.

Even at this late date, since the storm, there is a continual stream of water coming onto the property that will almost fill the four-inch drain pipe. We have told you before and hope you will recall that the only storm drain is more than four feet above this stream of water. Were it

not for the fact that the property's plumbing is adequate there would be a permanent pond, and would not be on the Cox property.

Since property is being taxed for construction of this sewer, I will be glad to show any taxpayer how adequate our \$15,000 (or more) sewer is. The City Manager and a minority of the council saw a need for a storm drain but was overruled.

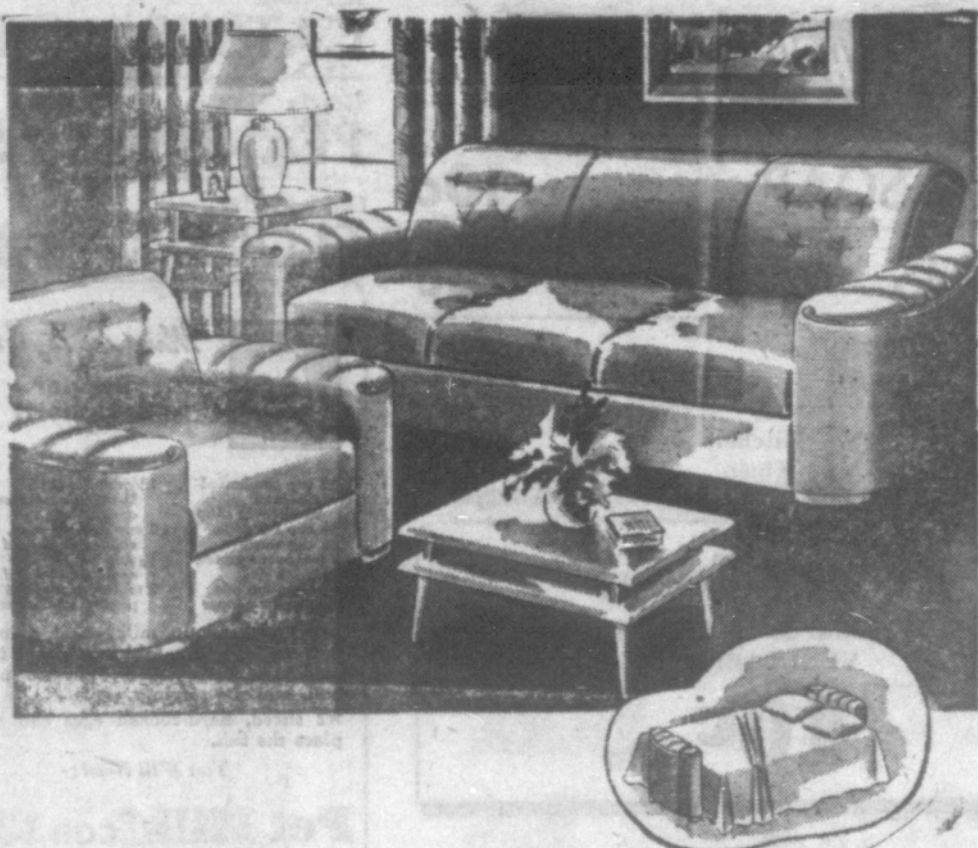
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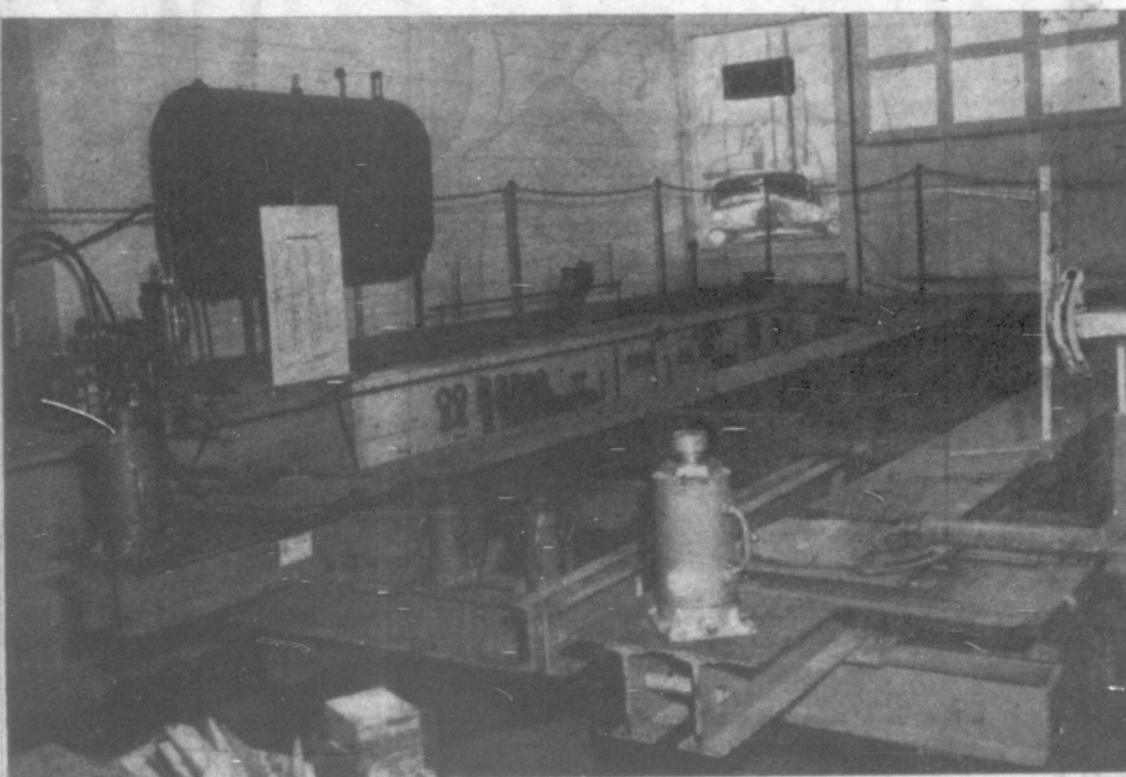
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
