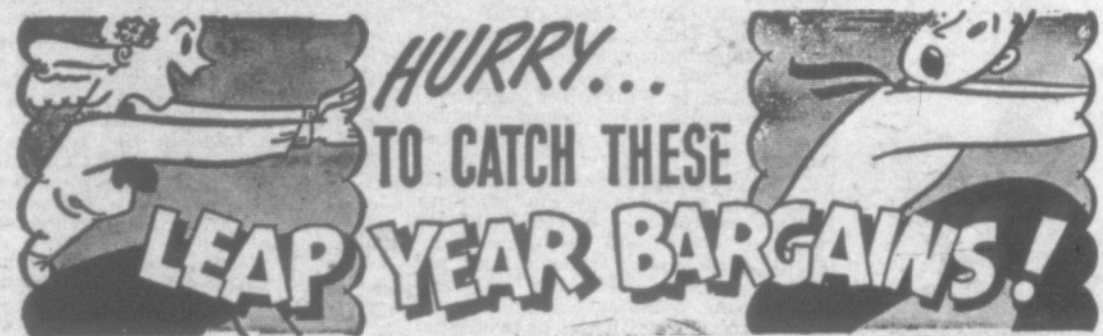

Supper Spaghetti

1/4 cup condensed cream of mushroom soup
1/2 cup Pet Milk
1/2 cup water
2 teaspoons grated onion
1/2 teaspoon salt
few grains pepper

1 1/2 cups cooked spaghetti, macaroni or noodles
1 cup drained peas, cooked or canned
1/2 cup flaked fish, cooked or canned
2 tablespoons diced pimientos (can omit)

Mix together soup, milk, water, onion, salt and pepper. Add remaining ingredients. Heat slowly, but do not boil. Makes 4 servings.

*2 sliced, hard-cooked eggs can replace the fish.
