Mrs. Martha Johnson accepted a position in Coquille at the Roxy lunch counter. Mrs. Johnson is a sister of Mrs. James McColl.

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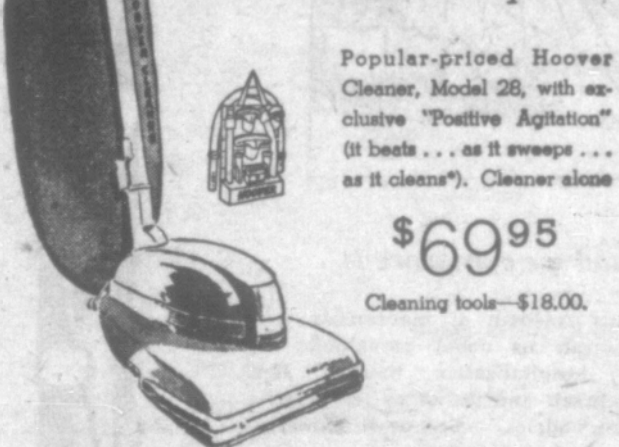
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
