

Game Commission Sets Final Angling Regulations For 1948 Seasons

The final angling regulations for 1948 were adopted January 26 by the Oregon State Game Commission after reconvening its hearing from two weeks ago when tentative regulations were formulated.

The order proposing to limit attractor blades to one on a line and the number of hooks to one set was not adopted, and the regulation will remain the same as last year.

Trout season and bag limits in general will remain as originally announced. The general season will be May 1 to September 30 in the state with the exception that the season for coastal streams will be from May 1 to October 31 above tide-water and from June 15 to October 31 in tidewater. Minimum length limit for trout will be eight inches in the coastal waters and six inches in the rest of the state.

The season for salmon and steelhead over 20 inches will be the entire year for the state except that coastal streams and tributaries of the Columbia river below the city limits of St. Helens will be closed during March and April. The Wilson, Trask and Nehalem rivers will be closed to all salmon fishing from March 1 to September 15, while the Miami river will be closed to all fishing during the month of November. There will be no open season in the winter for steelhead in the Willamette river and its tributaries above Oregon City Falls except the Santiam river and its north and south forks. The bag limit for salmon and steelhead over twenty inches will be 2 a day or 1 in any 7 consecutive days or in possession, but not more than 20 during any one year.

The jack salmon bag limit will be 10 fish a day, but not more than 20 in possession at any one time; provided that during the open trout season the bag limit for jack salmon is to be counted in and as part of the general trout bag limit.

Last year's closure of certain coastal tributaries will remain in effect this year, instead of being opened

The regulation proposing to close boat fishing in the Tillamook county streams above the head of tidewater was rescinded and will not be in effect.

A few changes in county regulations from those announced two weeks ago also were made and are here briefly summarized. The complete regulations for each county, including the regulations left unchanged and the new ones will be included in the annual angling synopsis which will be available sometime after March 1.

Coos County
Closed to all angling: All tributaries of East Fork Coquille, Middle Fork Coquille, South Fork Coquille and North Fork Coquille except Middle creek.

Closed to all angling from September 1 to April 30: That part of North Fork Coquille river above Hudson creek; Middle creek; East Fork Coquille river above Elk creek; Middle Fork Coquille river above Myrtle creek; South Fork above Coal creek.

Rogue River Regulations
The following changes were made: For trout not less than fifteen inches open season is September 16 to November 30 in the Rogue river, exclusive of its tributaries, below Sandy Cove bridge; January 15 to February 15 in Rogue river, exclusive of its tributaries, below mouth of Applegate river; September 16 to February 15 in that part of the Illinois river, exclusive of its tributaries, from its confluence with the Rogue river to Illinois Falls. Bag limit is 3 fish per day, but not more than 6 fish in any 7 consecutive days or in possession.

Beavers To Meet Huskies Friday, Saturday Nights

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 29.—Washington's Huskies, the team picked by most experts to wrest the northern division hoop crown from Oregon State's defending champions, will invade Corvallis for a crucial two-game series against the Beavers Friday and Saturday nights. The two clubs will renew hostilities a week later at Seattle and the outcome of the four games might very well determine the league's 1948 champion.

The Seattle quintet, apparently intent on justifying the experts' predictions, moved into the division leadership by whipping Oregon twice last week end, 48-44 and 56-39. Washington now has four victories against two defeats while Slat Gill's Beavers are half a game behind with a 3 and 2 record.

After playing five games in eight days, the Orange have been idle since January 17 with the result they are well rested for the Huskies. The club has been strengthened considerably by the return to the lineup of Alex Petersen, veteran 6 foot, 5 inch center. Big Pete missed the first five conference starts because of a bad case of tonsillitis.

With Petersen back in action, the Beavers will have some much needed height which they sorely needed in competition with the other division members. Gill plans no other changes in his regular lineup of Norm Carey and Cliff Crandall, forwards; and Jim Catterall and Dan Torrey, guards.

Art McLarney, in his first year as head coach at Washington, has an all-veteran team paced by the brilliant center, Jack Nichols. The Husky center is well on his way to breaking the all-time division individual scoring record. Other probable starters for Washington are Sam White and Bill Vandenberg, forwards; and Bobby Jorgensen and Bill Taylor, guards.

Veterans Interested In Home Loans

The most popular question asked by Oregon veterans interviewed by the state Department of Veterans' Affairs last year pertained to the \$6,000 farm and home loan available to eligible ex-servicemen of World War II, a yearly roundup completed this week disclosed.

Of 30,156 interviews conducted in 1947 in the Portland and Salem offices of the state veterans' agency, 5,284 were with those seeking information and counseling or applying for the loan.

GI educational benefits were next most important to Oregon veterans, with 4,468 interviews on this subject. Terminal leave bond applications ran third, with 3,055 interviews, while GI insurance with 2,859, state educational benefits with 2,195, and apprenticeship under the GI job training program with 1,803 interviews followed.

Counseling and assistance also were given the veteran or his dependents on disability compensation claims, pensions, employment and hospitalization, with a thousand or more persons being interviewed on each of these items.

Of the state loan interviews, 722 resulted in applications. Of these, 457 were granted loans amounting to \$1,597,725, for an average of \$3,496 per loan.

A marked increase in loan applications followed liberalization of the act by the 1947 legislature. Largest month for applications was September with 109, and the greatest number of loans approved in one month came in October, with 80. By the end of 1947 a total of 831 loans had been granted in the two years and three months of the department's operations, amounting to \$2,417,169.

The week of June 2 to June 8 saw only one traffic fatality reported in Oregon in 1946. That was the lowest record for any one week of the entire year, according to the Oregon State Motor association.
