Carl's Return After 4600 Mile Auto Jaunt Takes Them Through Scenic Southwest

A Coos county dairyman sees the sights! That's the way Mr. and Mrs. John Carl of Arago considered themselves when they spent the past four weeks on a trip throughout the Southwest that took them a total of 4600 miles in all from Arago to Arago, via Utah, Arizona, California, and Oregon.

Leaving the Coquille Valley on January 3, Mr. and Mrs. Carl visited first the Zion National park in Utah which they enjoyed immensely. They then visited Boulder Dam, Phoenix, Arizona, the Petrified Forest, and the Grand Canyon.

Clear weather was encountered on the entire trip, Mr. Carl said, and though it was cool at night, it was warm during the day. They found many vacationists at all the scenic spots and lots on the rim of the Grand Canyon.

A surprise to the Carl's was the fact that Flagstaff, Arizona, is a large lumbering center with large pine forests around the city of 11,000. This city is 7,000 feet above sea level, and has a fine climate, Mr. Carl said.

In California they found oranges and other fruit in a depressed market, and a severe frost may have injured much of the fruit still on the trees. Dry farmers are in danger of losing their crops, but farmers who have irrigated farms are still pumping some water he said.

During the trip the Carl's visited over 20 different families of former Coos county people or relatives of the Carl's.

Total expenditure for gas and oil was slightly over \$78.00 with a mile-

age made on the trip of nearly 19 miles to the gallon. Costs are very much equal to costs on the Oregon coast, the Carl's said, with cabins renting for four dollars, and food being the same price as it is in Coquille.
