

Cottage Cheese Masquerades As Delicious New And Exciting Meal-Time Foodstuff

Homemakers are always looking for new, different ways to prepare and use everyday foodstuffs. It is really a delight to discover an old mealtime standby disguised in a new delicious form. Everyone knows about such famous food masquerades as carrot pudding, potato cake and squash pie. But did you know that cottage cheese is equally as versatile, and that many interesting and delicious "costume changes" have been developed for this tasty dairy product? It is a longer thought of only as a salad ingredient, but as the basis for such delicious desserts as this recipe for Coventry Tarts. Its creamy orange filling will keep family and friends guessing.

Coventry Tarts

1 1/2 lb. cottage cheese
1/2 cup honey
4 tablespoons butter, melted
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
1/2 tsp salt
1/4 tsp cinnamon
1/4 tsp nutmeg
1 tablespoon grated orange rind
1 tsp orange juice

Pastry

Line 8 large or 12 small individual tart pans with pastry. Combine all of the ingredients stirring until thoroughly blended. Pour into tart shells. Bake in hot oven, 450 degrees, for 10 minutes; reduce heat to 325 degrees, and bake about 20 minutes until golden brown. Cool and serve plain or topped with whipped cream and currant jelly.

Often times the very name of a pudding is descriptive of its appearance or ancestry, or expressive of a humorous or homey quality. Names like Topsy, Cottage, Indian, Cabinet, puff, quaker, snow Queen, are familiar titles and each pudding is as individual as the name implies. We don't know where Cardinal Pudding was originated but we do know it will make a hit whenever you serve it. This pudding is another of our masquerade "costumes" for cottage cheese, and a delicious one too!

Cardinal Cherry Pudding

1 cup sifted cake flour
1/2 tsp soda
1/2 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp salt
1 cup sugar
4 tbsp butter

1 egg
1 cup cream style cottage cheese
1 tsp grated lemon rind
Sift flour once, measure and resift with soda, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in butter with two knives until mixture resembles coarse meal. Add egg, cottage cheese and lemon rind and beat vigorously for two minutes. Serve warm with cherry sauce.

Cherry Sauce

1/2 cup sugar
1/2 tsp salt
2 tbsp cornstarch
1 cup cherry juice
1 tsp butter
2 tsp lemon juice
1 cup canned sour cherries
Combine sugar, salt and cornstarch, blending well. Add fruit juice. Cook over low heat, stirring until sauce thickens and is clear. Add Serves 6.
