Members Urged To Enroll Now

Any 4-H livestock clubs not yet organized or individual members not yet enrolled should do so right away, J. K. Beeson, assistant county agent, said today. April is the last month in which club members can get dairy or beef animals and qualify for the required six-months ownership by October 31, the close of the 1948 club year.

To date there are 133 agricultural project enrollments in Coos county. These include 97 dairy club members, six dairy record-keeping, 13 beef, six sheep, four chicken, three pig and three rabbit club members.

Mary Lee Taylor's Easy Mix Cake

- 1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup soft shortening
- 1/2 cup Pet Milk
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 unbeaten egg

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Grease, then dust with flour an 8-inch pan, 2 inches deep. Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Add shortening, milk, water and vanilla. Beat vigorously 2 min. with mixing spoon, or electric beater at medium speed. Then add egg and beat 2 min. longer. Put into pan. Bake on center shelf of oven 35 min., or until cake shrinks from sides of pan. Remove from oven; let stand in pan 5 min. before turning out. Spread with Caramel Frosting (see below).

- 1/2 cup light brown sugar, lightly packed
- 2 1/2 tablespoons Pet Milk
- 1 1/2 teaspoons butter or margarine
- few grains salt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cups powdered sugar

Mix together in saucepan brown sugar, milk, butter and salt. Heat and stir until mixture boils; cool. Stir in vanilla. Add powdered sugar, about 3 tablesp. at a time, until thick enough to spread. Beat until creamy. Spread on top and sides of Easy Mix Cake (see above).
