TIPS FOR.... HOME MAKERS

Here comes news for the folks who render lard. A simple process for improving the keeping quality has been found. In fact tests have shown lard remains fresh approximately twice as long if treated in this way. Add two to three pounds of hydrogenated vegetable shortening to fifty pounds of lard at the time of rendering. The preferred procedure is to add the vegetable shortening to the rendered lard in the kettle just before settling and separating the crackings. Another method is to add the shortening to the melted lard in the storage container.

An old mailing tube is an ideal base on which to roll up linens you don't want creased.

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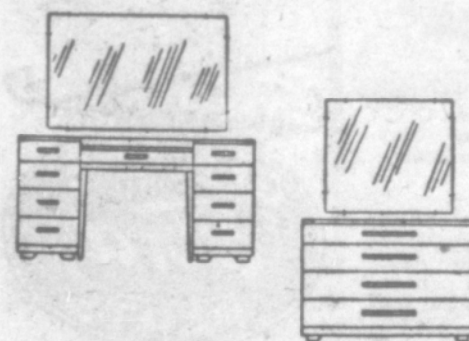
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
