Coos-Curry Cooperative Makes Big Sales During Month of March, Report Shows

Sales of over \$37,528.27 were reported to the directors this week by the recently organized Coos-Curry Farmers' Cooperative for the month of March.

According to the statement just released by President Quincy Corrie and Manager Don Auer of the cooperative supply organization, a still better month is due for April.

"The response of our patrons has been highly encouraging," Mr. Corrie stated, "and we plan to add further lines of farm supplies, including gasoline and petroleum products, fertilizer and spray materials, farm machinery and other items as far as additional memberships and investment funds make it possible for expansion."

The local cooperative has applied for membership in the Pacific Supply Cooperative in which there are at present time over 200 cooperatives similar to the Coos group. It makes a total purchasing power of 65,000 farm families, Manager Auer said.

Situated at Bandon and at the former Government Chrome plant on highway 101, the cooperative group has just added a new 2 ton Studebaker truck. Harry Heffley is warehouse manager, and Sam Brady is truck driver.

At present there are 120 volunteer members.

Social Security Not Identification

Social Security account cards are not good identification for cashing checks or establishing credit. That is the warning Carl D. Monroe, manager of the Eugene office of the Social Security administration.

Some local business firms, Monroe says, have been using Social Security account cards for identification, only to find that information concerning the individual cannot be secured from the Social Security administration. The federal government does not maintain current addresses of account number holders, and the Social Security administration is prohibited by law from disclosing personal information in its files.

"The Social Security administration, itself, does not accept the account card as identification in paying old-age and survivors insurance claims," Monroe said. "Before paying a claim we require the applicant to identify the account by furnishing us the wage earner's date and place of birth, his full name, and sometimes other information."
