Will Take Course—Dr. Marshall Kennedy left on Sunday for Portland where he will take a special course in x-ray work at the University of Oregon Medical school.

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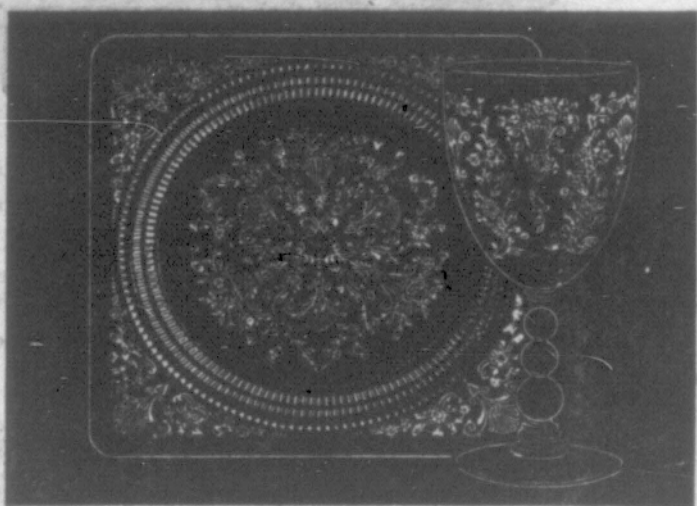
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
