School Lay Men Meet At Coos Bay

A panel of lay men met with school representatives at Marshfield high school in the library on Monday evening to make plans for regional conference for teachers.

The date set for the Coos-Curry Regional conference is October 7 and 8. The plan which was worked out was for the lay panel, which has been chosen from the different industrial areas, on the morning of October 7th to present before the teachers points in line with the general theme, "What can we do to have a better school." This panel discussion will be carried on under the coordinator, Dr. Elmo Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon College of Education.

Following the panel discussion the teachers (approximately 320) will break into groups and participate in discussion under the leadership of leaders and co-leaders.

The financial statement for rehabilitation and Child Welfare for the past year has been released this week by Mrs. Mabel Kunz, poppy chairman for the Coquille Legion Auxiliary, and Mrs. Dorothy Harris, poppy poster chairman for the same organization.

The statement shows a cash balance forward of \$103.45, receipts from the last Poppy sale \$236.50, receipts from Gifts to the Yanks, \$249.43, and bal-

ance from the Armistice day breakfast \$22.15.

Disbursements show purchase of poppies \$167.35; Girls State, \$26.30; Check-a-Month, \$24.00; Aid Veterans' families, \$50.00; Gifts to Yanks, \$27.43; Dishes for burned-out family, \$6.45; Red Cross (help on hospital bill for veteran's wife), \$25.00; flowers (funerals), \$8.00; cigarettes (birthday gifts for adopted man at Roseburg Facility), \$1.48; clothing for French orphan, \$10.08; balance remaining in fund, \$58.31.

Arrangements are now being made for this year's sale of poppies, proceeds from which will be used in further rehabilitation work. Assisting Mrs. Kunz and Mrs. Harris on the poppy committee are Mesdames Margaret Alborn, Wave Head, Eva McCue and Bernice Rackleff.
