Croix de Guerre Presented H. R. Turkel

Mrs. Clara Stauff this week received word of the presentation of the military decoration, the "Croix de Guerre," to her son-in-law, Harry R. Turkel.

Quoting from the Mexico City paper, "A ceremony held in the residence of the French Military and Naval Attaché on Monday, (April 26), Harry R. Turkel, First Secretary of the American Embassy and expert in the Economic Unit, received the high military decoration of 'Croix de Guerre' with gold star that he was awarded by General De Gaulle for heroism in the invasions of North Africa and Normandy. Mr. Turkel, then a Lieutenant Colonel in the U. S. army was wounded in the campaign in France. He received the decoration at the hands of captain de Fragaat Rouvillou of the French Embassy and the ceremony was attended by French Ambassador Lescuyer, Mrs. Turkel and the two Turkel children, as well as members of the French and American Embassy staffs.

"After release from the army, Mr. Turkel returned to his duties in the Department of State in Washington, D. C., and was assigned to the United States Embassy in Mexico in September 1947."

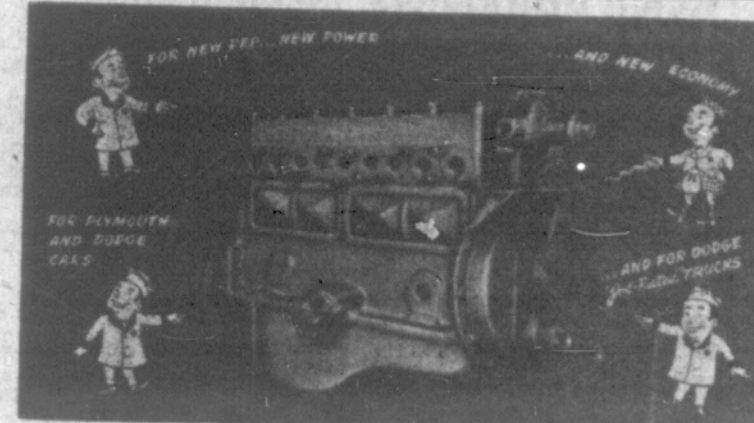
Play Day Held By School Children

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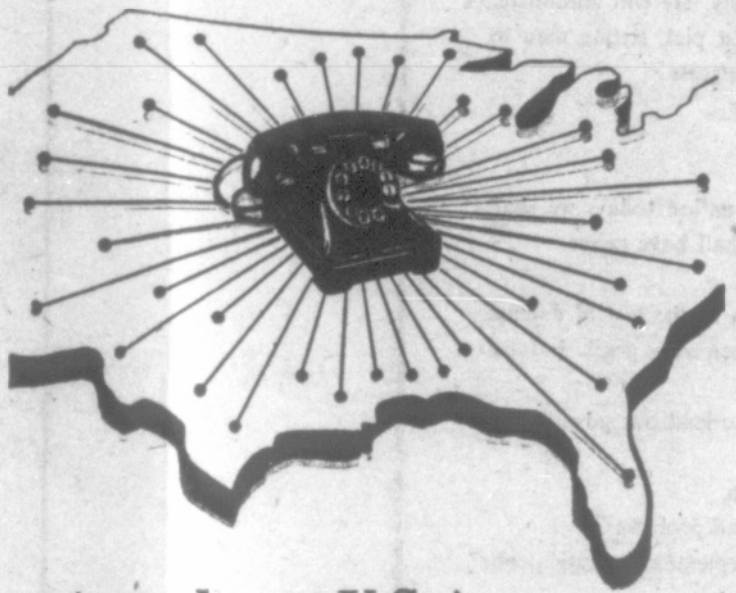
