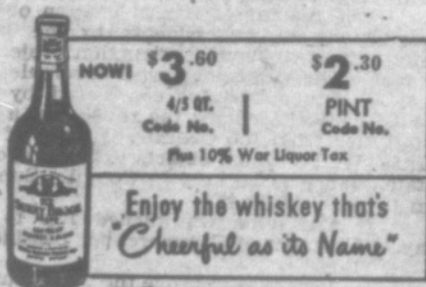
**Return From Business Trip**—Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Menning returned at the week-end from a business trip

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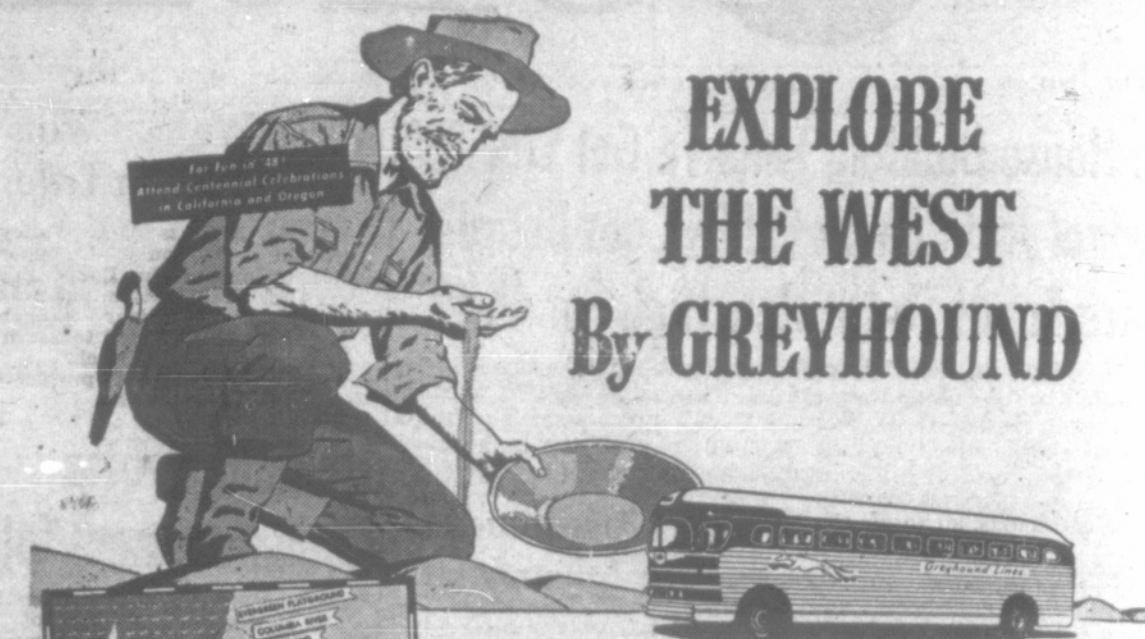
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
