Both Mr. and Mrs. Yarbrough are natives of Oregon. Mr. Yarbrough hailing from Ashland and Mrs. Yarbrough from neighboring Coos Bay. The couple came to Coquille just eleven years ago to take over the dairy and delicatessen store.

Previously Mr. Yarbrough was in the meat business. In fact the Coquille store at that time did a thriving trade in the meat line. During the war, however, help was so hard to get, the Yarbroughs decided to discontinue the meat department.

At the present time both Mr. and Mrs. Yarbrough find their hands full with their expanding dairy trade. They supply all local stores with dairy products as well as maintaining a retail delivery. New dairy equipment has recently been installed and Hap Ruckliff, a graduate of Oregon State college, has been employed to take charge of the plant.

Mrs. Yarbrough is bookkeeper for the firm and assists Mr. Yarbrough with the retail store trade. Mrs. Yarbrough is unstinting in his praise of the manner in which she has worked with him since the opening of the store.

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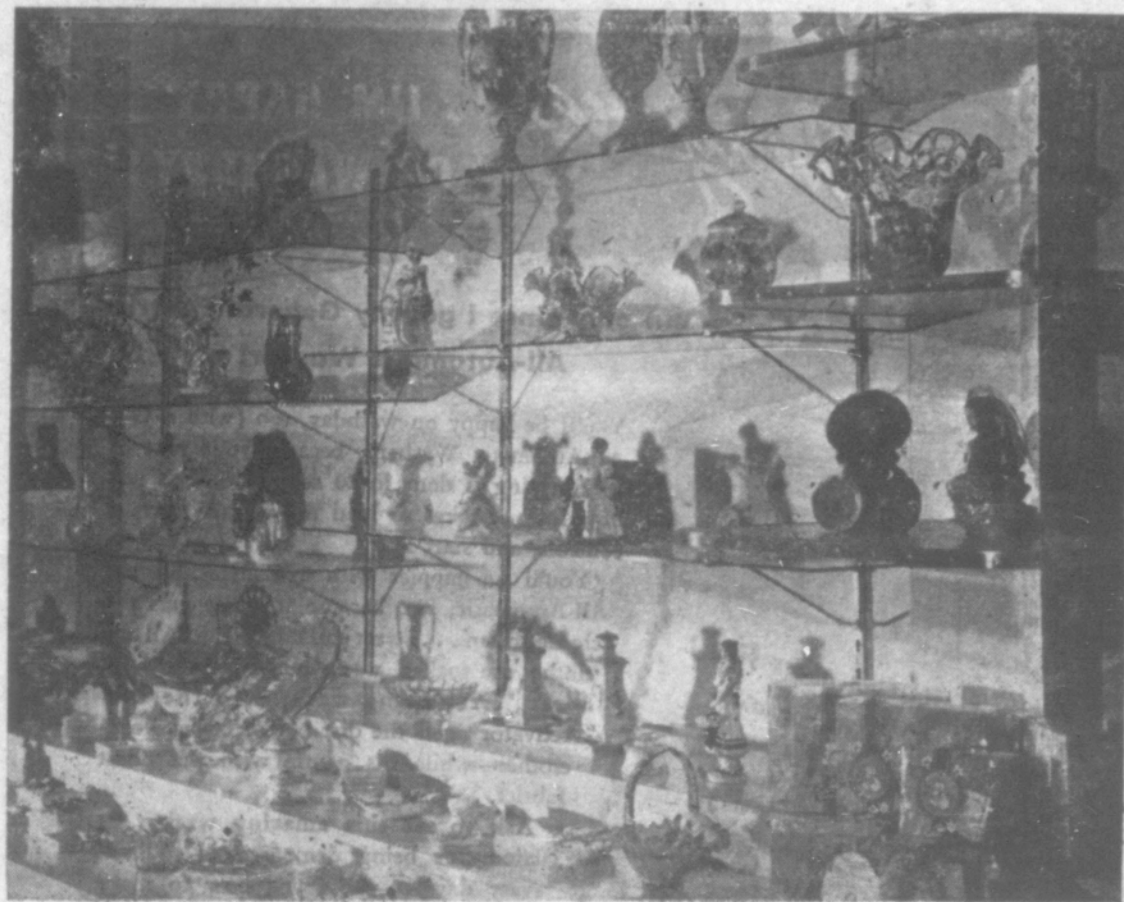
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
