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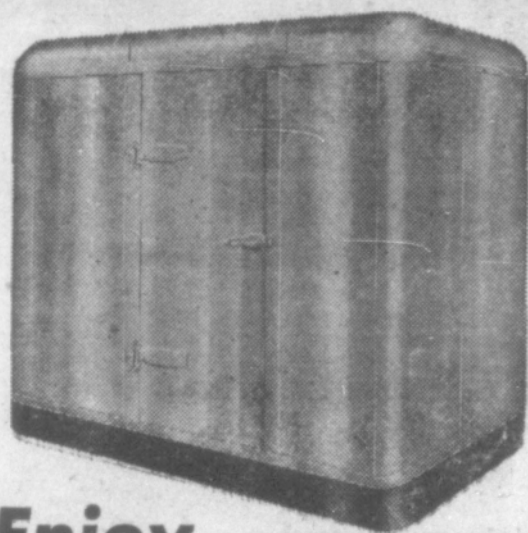


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Return From Spokane.—Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Schroeder returned this week from Spokane where they attended a convention of funeral directors.
