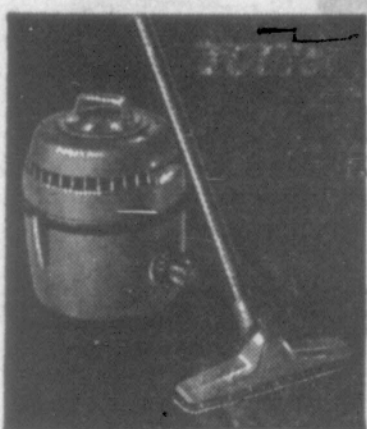
### Shower Honors Bride - Elect

River flood conditions in the north-west did not stop the tourist flood to this area, Oregon State Motor Association officials declared today.

Many direct inquiries from people in the midwest have been received by the association, indicating prospective travelers had heard about the flood and wondered if they would be forced to cancel plans for their northwest trips.

During the flood crisis, the Motor association answered an estimated 10,000 telephone calls for road information in the stricken areas, it was reported. The association maintained service throughout the flood period, checking conditions almost hourly and keeping up to the minute information on routes to all points in the northwest.

## Coquille Sergeant To Go On Alaskan Trip

Sgt. Jerald G. Gauer (566567) U.S.M.C. will leave the United States on June 14th from San Diego harbor, to go with the 1948 Expedition to Alaska. The expedition is an annual supply and observation trip for supplying weather and geological stations well within the Arctic circle. They will also have supplier, ranging from paper clips to giant cranes for the Petroleum Reserve No. 4 Camp, located 300 miles east of Point Barrow.

The expedition is an experiment to find if it is possible to run the supply schedule ahead of schedule by as much as three to five months. Because of the short and uncertain period in the summer that the channels aren't completely ice blocked, timing and weather conditions will play an important part. This year a Marine detachment from the 1st Amphibious Tractor Bn., 1st Marine division, will attempt to use tracked vehicles in order to travel across the extremely ice bound and hazardous terrain.

Because of the dangerous ice flows and jams, land-based planes will accompany the expedition. The expedition will be composed of two A.K.A. (cargo assault ships), two L.S.T.'s (landing ship tank) and two ice breakers, one of which is the U.S.S. Burton Island, a veteran of four trips to the Antarctic region and two trips to the Arctic circle.

The expedition will be in Seattle, Washington, for one week and leave for Point Barrow, Alaska, around the 1st of July. The expedition will return in September in order to beat the ice blockade in the Arctic channels. The men will work 24 hours per day in shifts of six hours, as the sun will not be setting while they are there.

Sgt. Gauer returned to the U. S. last August after spending 23 months in the Western Pacific area and Guam. He will be here for 30 days when he returns to the U. S. this fall. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Gauer of Coquille.

## Carter Extension Set As 40 Foot

Any extension of Carter avenue should not be made of less than 40 feet wide, the city council announced Monday night. This was in answer to a group of Carter avenue residents requesting a dedicated street from 11th north.

The city planning commission after a study of the proposed street suggested that a minimum of at least forty feet be required for the width of the new street.

Several members of the council at first felt that only a sixty foot street should be accepted but later accepted the opinion of the planning commission that a forty foot street would be wide enough.

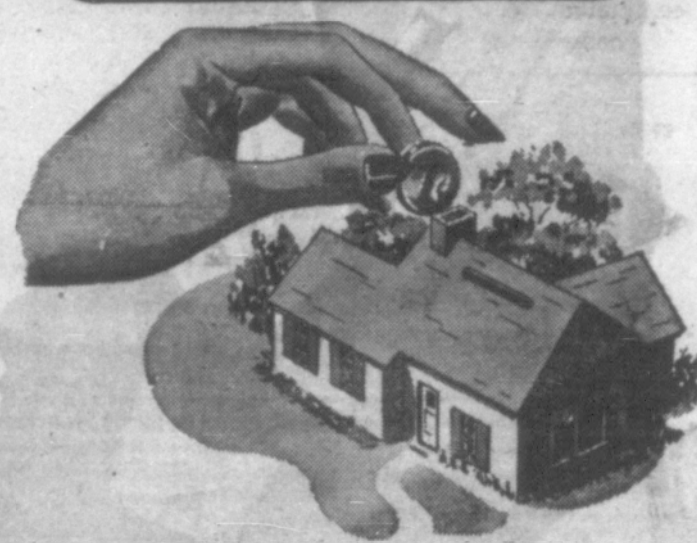
