1 lb. ground beef
1 cup left-over bread,
pulled into crumbs
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard

Mix together beef, crumbs, salt, pepper, mustard, catsup and milk. Shape into 4 oblong patties about 3/4 inch thick. Brown onion slices slowly on both sides in hot shortening. Remove from pan.
