Annual Reports Given At B.P.W. Club Meeting Monday Night in Junior Auditorium

Highlighting the meeting of the Business and Professional Women's club held on Monday evening in the junior auditorium of the Community building was the presentation of the annual reports of all of the standing committees.

The reports showed an unusually active and successful year. The president's report, given by Miss Inez Rover, gave a general survey of the year's work on such projects as the purchase of books for the city library, cooperation with the Red Cross, the Christmas seal sale which was managed locally by the B. P. W. club, the club's own scholarship loan fund and the participation in the annual Fourth of July celebration.

Miss Rover told of her own and of other members' attendance at all of the various district conference and conventions of the State federation, pointing out that the Coquille club now holds two positions on the state B. P. W. board; Mrs. J. S. Barton, Sr., being the state second vice president, and Dr. Eleanor Gutman being the state health chairman, while she herself is a member of the nominating committee for the State Federation for the coming year.

Continuing, Miss Rover enumerated the wide range of topics presented for study and discussion at regular meetings and told of some of the outstanding social events of the year, mentioning particularly the annual party for the senior girls of Coquille high school and the annual mothers' dinner, both involving non-members as guests of the club.

Mrs. Orville Newton, finance chairman, gave a clear cut picture of the work required to finance the local club, and Mrs. J. S. Barton, Sr., legislative chairman, told of the participation of the Coquille club not only in local affairs but in state and national affairs, both club and governmental.

The International Relations chairman, Dr. Eleanor Gutman, reported on Coquille's success in cooperating with the State Federation's project in helping Chinese women. The local club has raised over eighty dollars for the education fund which will provide four one-year scholarships for training Chinese girls in nursing and home economics.

During the business session plans for the float being planned for the Fourth of July celebration were disclosed by Dr. Gutman, chairman of the float committee. Mrs. Hal Pierce, chairman of the concession committee, reported that concession plans were proceeding favorably.

A letter was read from Mrs. Custer, formerly Mrs. Florence Hallock. One new member, Elynor Oerding, was elected to membership.

Because the next meeting date falls on the last night of the celebration, it was decided to dispense with the first meeting in July and hold the evening, July 10. This will be the first meeting under the newly installed officers.

Two guests were introduced, Mrs. Ralph Flannery and Miss Annie Fenell.

After the meeting refreshments were served at a daintily appointed tea table, the centerpiece of which was a bowl of white carnations flanked by yellow candles in crystal holders. Mrs. Leona Bryant poured while the cake was served by Mrs. J. P. Beyers. The cake, beautifully iced and decorated with pale yellow roses and green leaves, symbolic of the club colors, was presented to the members by Miss Rover as a final gesture of her year as president.

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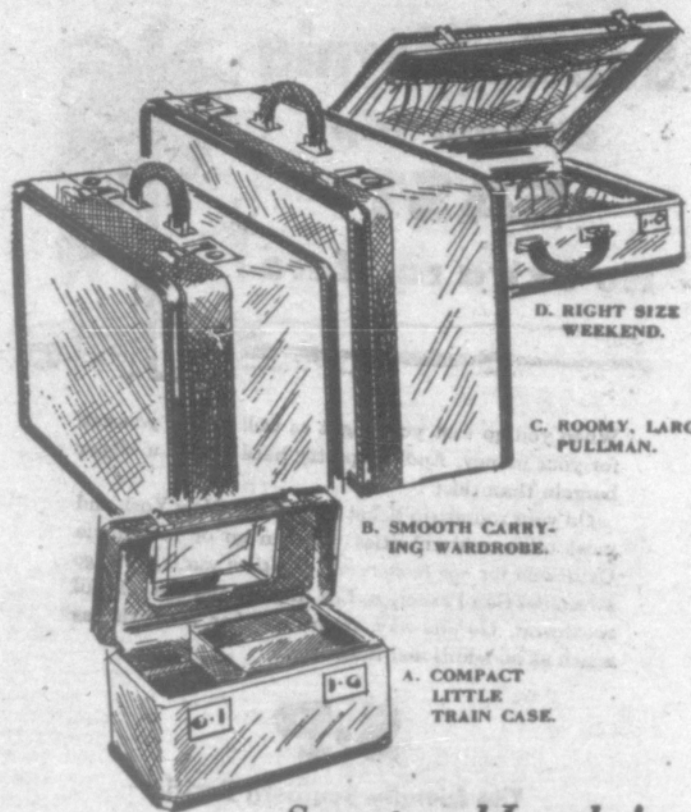
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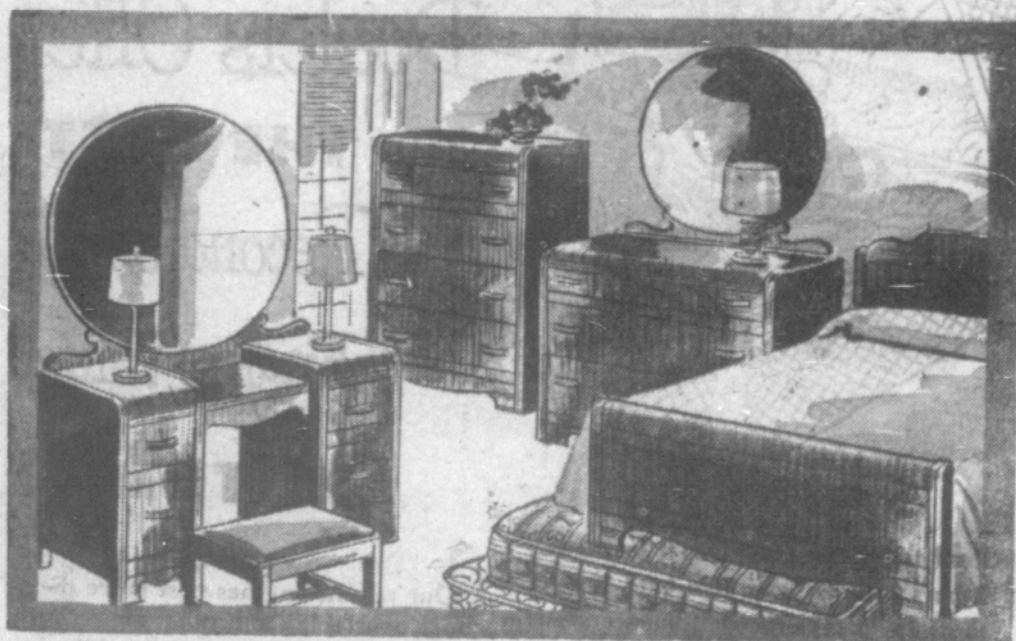
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
