Lamb Patties  
New Potatoes  
Creamed Peas  
Cucumber Salad

Pin Money Cookies

Pin Money Cookies

2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup soft shortening  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1/2 cup Pet Milk  
1/2 cup shredded coconut  
1 cup corn flakes

Turn on oven; set at moderate (375° F.). Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Put shortening and vanilla into mixing bowl. Add sugar gradually, mixing until light and fluffy. Beat in egg vigorously. Stir in milk. Add flour mixture, about 1/2 at a time, mixing well after each addition. Fold in coconut and corn flakes. Drop from a teaspoon onto greased baking sheet 2 in. apart. Bake on top shelf of oven 12 min., or until brown. Makes 4 doz.

\*For the coconut, use the bulk kind or that sold in cans.
