Professional 11's Meet In August

According to inquiries regarding the opening game of the 1948 gridiron season in Multnomah stadium, Portland, Sunday night, August 8, between the Los Angeles Dons and Baltimore Colts, Jimmy Richardson, stadium manager, expects a record crowd to watch the two All-America football conference teams in action.

The Los Angeles Dons-Baltimore Colts clash marks the third straight year that two teams of the conference have opened the season in Multnomah stadium and in each case the score as well as the game has been close and hard fought.

Brooklyn Dodgers played Chicago Rockets in 1946, and in 1947 Brooklyn clashed with the Los Angeles Dons, the latter team featuring a stellar lineup of all-America stars.

With Jimmy Phelan as coach of the Los Angeles Dons and making his debut as coach of a professional football team it was no problem for Richardson to again invite the Dons to open the gridiron season in Multnomah stadium. Phelan's University of Washington Huskies played to the largest crowd ever to watch a game in Multnomah stadium when, in 1930, in a game against Oregon, the teams drew the capacity crowd of 35,266. Richardson hopes for a repeat performance as far as attendance is concerned come August 8.

The Los Angeles Dons will be featuring Herman Wedemeyer, former St. Mary's college all-American halfback in his first try at professional football. The great Glen Dobbs, all-American triple threat star, will also be with the Dons.

Making his debut as a professional gridder with the Baltimore Colts will be Jake Leicht, former University of Oregon halfback, whom many consider one of the greatest players ever to represent the Oregon institution. Charlie O'Rourke, former Boston college quarterback, will lead the Colts. Dick Barwegen, guard, the only player ever to be selected four times for the All-Star game in Chicago, will also be with the Colts.

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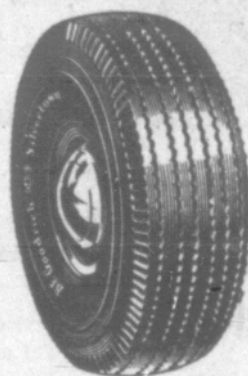


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
