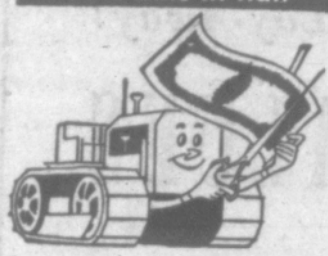

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4-H Club News

Dates have been set for the South Coast livestock and crops judging tour—August 6 and 7. Includes club members from Coos, Curry, western Lane and western Douglas.

Details will be worked out by Bob Knox and myself. Someone from State Club office will probably be present, either Carl Monroe or Burton Hutton.

Next event on the 4-H calendar is Summer Camp to be held July 28 to Aug. 1 at Camp Lawhorn.

Scholarships will be awarded in the next week or so and winners will be notified. All members 11 years or over are eligible and any boy or girl who wishes to attend but does not have a scholarship may pay his or her own way.

We are fast approaching the time of year when weather conditions may make farm animals uncomfortable. It will be well, therefore, for 4-H livestock club members to give their animals some special attention if they expect to get the best results.

Fresh water, available salt, shade and freedom from flies are essential. If these points are neglected, the animals will not be in tip-top shape and cannot be shown to the best advantage.

Four-H club members should start fitting their animals for exhibition at the County Fair now. Animals should be fed so that breeding animals will be in good condition.

Brush the animals often between now and Fair time to make their hair sleek and shiny.

Training animals to lead should be well under way, but now is the time to really bear down. A few minutes spent with the animal each day is better than an hour or two once a week.

Irrigation, weed control and insect control are the big problems of 4-H garden club members during the summer months.

Weeds are much easier to kill when they are small. Get them before they have a chance to rob the garden soil of its moisture.

Watch closely for insects and take measures to control them before they permanently damage the vegetable.

When you irrigate use enough water to do some good. A light sprinkling which wets the soil down only half an inch does very little good. The moisture evaporates before it gets down to the plant roots.
