There are 1700 cabins and tents ready for occupancy by the thousands who will converge on the camp for the opening on July 14.

Biggs, Oregon state president of the church, is leading out in the organization and program of this huge encampment, which includes a continuous series of meetings and special features from 6:30 each morning until the end of the evening session at 9:30, in six different auditoriums and meeting halls.

"Campmeeting is one of the strong traditions of the Adventist church and is an occasion for spiritual and inspirational uplift for young and old," says Elder Biggs. High-ranking officers of the denomination, including Elder J. L. McElhaney, world president of the church, will speak.

Adventist Campmeetings have been held in Oregon since 1877.

Young people from the Coquille Adventist church expect to attend the Pacific Northwest Youth Congress to be held immediately following the encampment at Gladstone, and will be attended by several thousand youth from five northwest states.

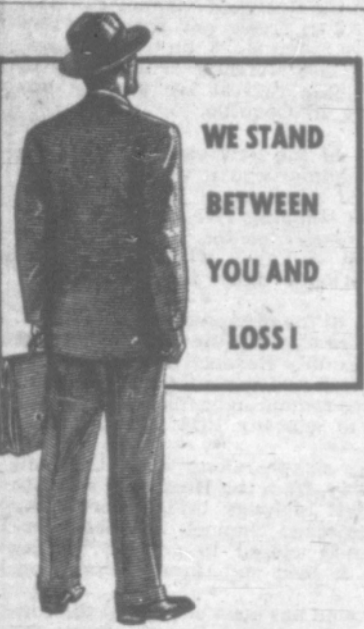
Eagles Hold Social Hour Friday
