Chocolate Peppermint Dessert

Broadcast: July 10, 1948

1/2 cup crushed peppermint stick candy
1/2 cup water
1 package chocolate pudding powder
1 cup Fat Milk
12 strips plain cake,* 1 x 3 x 1/2 in.

Cook candy slowly until melted in 1/2 cup water. Put pudding powder into saucepan. Stir in mixture of milk and remaining 1/2 cup water. Add melted candy. Heat and stir to boiling; then cook and stir 30 seconds. Cover and chill. Oil or rinse with water a quart mold. Line sides of mold with 8 strips of cake. Fill with layers of pudding and remaining 4 strips of cake. Have pudding on top and bottom. Chill until firm. Turn out to serve. Garnish with crushed peppermint stick candy, if desired. Makes 4 servings.

*Plain cake, pound, sponge or angel cake or split lady fingers can be used.
