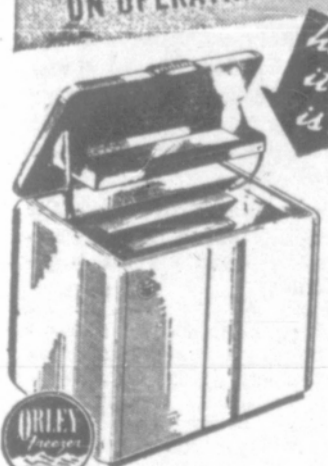

Grilled Frankfurters  
 Shoe String Potatoes  
 Creole Corn  
 (Recipe below)  
 Pickle Relish and Raw Carrot Strips  
 Frankfurter Buns  
 Lemon Sherbet

**Creole Corn**

2 tablespoons finely cut onion  
 1/2 cup finely cut green pepper  
 2 tablespoons bacon drippings  
 2 teaspoons flour

1/2 teaspoon salt  
 few grains pepper  
 1/2 cup condensed tomato soup  
 1/2 cup Fat Milk  
 1 1/2 cups drained, whole kernel corn

Cook onion and green pepper slowly in bacon drippings. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Stir in soup. Boil and stir 2 min. Mix together milk and corn; heat. Stir in hot soup mixture. Do not heat after combining. Makes 4 servings.
