Meal of the Week BY MARY LEE TAYLOR

Pan-Browned Ham Slices
with Milk Gravy
Boiled Potatoes in Jackets
Fried Tomatoes
Lettuce and Onion Salad
with French Dressing
Royal Peach Dessert
(Recipe below)

Royal Peach Dessert

Broadcast: August 21, 1948
1/2 cup Fat Milk
1 cup canned, sliced peaches
1/2 cup marshmallows, cut in small pieces
1/2 package lemon-flavored gelatin
1/2 teaspoon salt
6 finger-like strips of plain cake
1/4 cup diced cake

Chill milk until icy cold. Drain peaches; save juice. Save 1/4 cup peach slices; dice remaining peaches; mix with marshmallows and 2 tablespoons peach juice. Let stand. Add water to remaining peach juice to make 1/2 cup; heat to boiling. Stir in gelatin and salt. Cool to room temperature; add to marshmallow-fruit mixture. Chill until syrupy. Oil or rinse with cold water a 1 1/2-pint mold. Line mold with peach slices and strips of cake. Whip chilled milk with cold rotary beater, or electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Fold into gelatin mixture along with diced cake. Put into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold to serve. Makes 4 servings.

*Orange gelatin also can be used.

**Use sponge, angel or pound cake.
