Summer Roads Not Safe

Drivers who think summer road and weather conditions make it safe to speed up are working on a theory not born out by the facts, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry warns.

"Summer driving is less hazardous than winter driving, of course," Newbry said. "But what motorists tend to forget is the increased chance of death in any accident, due to higher speeds and heavier traffic."

The secretary blames much of the state's recent large death toll on high speeds induced by good roads and weather. In a survey of accident figures, he points out that the chance of death in any accident is more than twice as great in clear weather as in rain. Similarly, the chance for death is greater on a dry highway than on wet, snowy, or icy roads.

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"A moment's thought will show that this apparently unusual experience is due to slower driving speeds under the adverse conditions," Newbry declared. "The chance for death drops as speed drops. If we gave heavy traffic

the same consideration as a driving hazard we give to rain or snow, our summer fatality rate would be cut in half."

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
