Recipe of the Week "Sunday Best" Ginger Bread

1 pkg. gingerbread or ginger cake mix
1/2 cup granulated sugar
3 tablespoons cornstarch
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon grated lemon rind
2 cups boiling water
4 tablespoons lemon juice
1 3-oz. package cream cheese

Prepare the gingerbread according to the directions on the package. Make the lemon sauce by combining sugar, cornstarch, salt, and lemon rind in a saucepan. Add the boiling water gradually, stirring constantly. Remove from the stove and add the butter and the lemon juice. Cut a generous amount of the cream cheese and put on top of each square of gingerbread. Serve with hot lemon sauce poured over it.

Makeup: One fresh start on makeup during the day has more face value than constant patching up. Apply morning makeup in the daylight rather than under electric light. This can be done by placing a hand mirror against the window and sitting before the window. Powder should be lightly and evenly applied and practically not used at all where it is apt to clog the pores. Take a second look at your lipstick. Oregon Women Turn To Sewing Dresses

Oregon women, in line with a national trend, are turning to their own needles and thread in increasing numbers to combat the high cost of clothing, states Miss Lucy Lane, O. S. C. extension specialist in clothing and textiles.

This spring in just three Willamette valley counties, for example, approximately 500 cotton dresses were made under the supervision of extension leaders. The cotton dress workshops are designed to teach clothing construction technique. They are under the supervision of project leaders who in turn are trained by county home demonstration agents. In the three counties mentioned, Yamhill, Benton and Linn, 55 of these volunteer leaders were trained to conduct community cotton dress workshops.

In Jackson county eleven women volunteers held tailoring workshops where 64 suits and coats were made.

Miss Lane says the trend toward home sewing is sweeping the country. She points out that the National Wool Council has announced that the number of home seamstresses has increased 130 per cent during the past five years. Meanwhile, Federal Reserve board figures indicate that the fabric sales have risen 169 per cent from 1941 to 1947.

Home sewers paid out over 50 million dollars for 168 million patterns in 1947.

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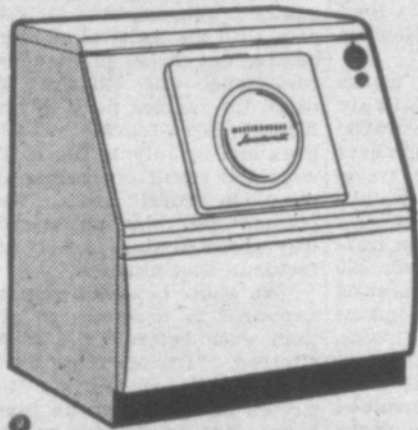
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
