Circuit Court

John Forsyth Duncan was found guilty of a charge of larceny of livestock at a hearing Wednesday. The case continued Friday when the passing of sentence was suspended for two years providing the defendant conducts himself as a law-abiding citizen. The court will consider dismissing the charge at the end of the two-year period.

Wilson Gregory, Wallace Milton Westberry, Theodore K. Johnson and O. V. Flowers, charged with larceny, were found guilty at a hearing Oct. 13.

The case of the state vs. James W. McMichael on a larceny charge was heard Oct. 13. A penitentiary sentence of two years was suspended and defendant was placed on a two-year parole.

James Robert Zumwalt, charged with obtaining money under false three-year penitentiary term.

Herbert Parsley, charged with larceny by embezzlement received a penitentiary sentence of one year. A stay of execution of sentence was granted for sixty days, less credit to be allowed for time already served in jail; at the end of which period the defendant will be placed on probation for one year.

Ramsey Thomas Vernon was sentenced to ninety days in jail on a charge of assault and battery. Robert DeWitt Nelson was found guilty of a charge of receiving stolen property. He was sentenced to a jail sentence of 30 days, to be placed on probation at the end of 30 days for period of one year. Frank Morrow, Jr., pleaded guilty to a charge of receiving stolen property. Sentence will be passed Monday, Oct. 25.

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Nevy Smith and Dalton Barklow pleaded not guilty to a charge of larceny. Hearing was set for Friday, Oct. 29.

The case of Frank C. Schlapp vs. Eunice E. Shore was settled as a voluntary non-suit, and the case of Ler. F. Clausen vs. S. J. A. C., was settled out of court.

Barton Warns of Communistic Infiltration

Guest speaker at the Coquille Woman's club meeting October 12th was Clarence Barton, who gave a timely and revealing discussion of Communistic activities and the insidious fashion in which Red forces are infiltrating their propaganda into these United States.

Mrs. Julius Ruble, president of the club, requested reports on the several conventions held during the summer. Mrs. O. C. Sanford, who was a delegate to the General Federation of Women's clubs convention at Portland in May, gave a series of statistics indicating the strength of the women's club organization.

According to Mrs. Sanford, it was reported at the meeting that the General Federation has a membership of more than three million throughout the United States with an affiliated membership throughout the world of 5,284,000 women. Through the re-education program sponsored by the Federation, entire schools in France, Finland, Holland, allied-occupied Germany and Greece have been adopted. All necessary text books, school supplies, and some food and clothing have been sent to these schools.

Mrs. Sanford also reported that at the convention, delegates were advised that Mrs. J. L. Blair Buck, the Federation president, worked with the International Relief committee and assisted in helping to bring about passage of the Marshall Plan.

There were 12,000 women, from 47 states and a number of foreign countries, present for the banquet which opened the convention. Among the speakers appearing on the program for the last meeting of the convention were Dr. Tsing Foo, member of the United Nations Council; Hollywood Czar Eric Johnston, and Secretary of State George Marshall. Mrs. Sanford quoted General Marshall as saying that the United Nations Council is far from perfect but he hesitated to criticize it. He also advised his audience to "Be patient with the United Nations, it is our only hope."

Mrs. Julius Ruble, who also attended the state convention, supplemented Mrs. Sanford's report. She stated that "Mobilizing for Peace," was the convention theme, and quoted from the speakers who emphasized how that mobilization might be accomplished.
