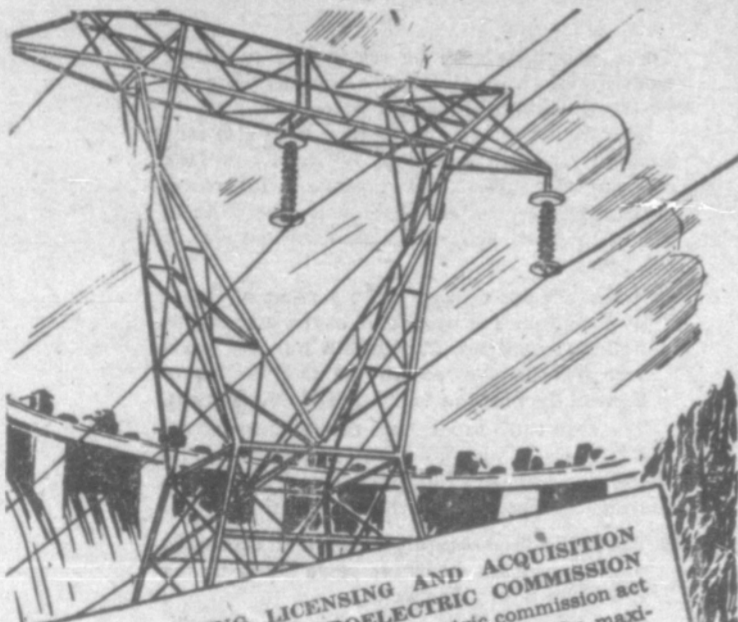

**BILL AMENDING LICENSING AND ACQUISITION PROVISIONS OF HYDROELECTRIC COMMISSION ACT**—Purpose: Amending hydroelectric commission act of Oregon requiring commission to set forth the maximum rate of return and amortization thereof shall have right to take over any project at expiration of the original investment; if not taken over, commission may issue new license upon payment of fair value not exceeding net investment; if not taken over, commission may issue new license under then existing laws or extend original license according to the terms and conditions thereof for periods of five years; providing further, upon payment of just compensation state has right to acquire project during any license period by condemnation.

## KEEPING HOUSE by Noima Crane FAMOUS HOME ECONOMIST

**THE VERSATILE VACUUM CLEANER:** Clean out your toaster, bread box, corners of the closets and radiators with the long crevice tool of your vacuum cleaner. Use the soft round brush for cleaning such items as moldings, picture frames, lamp shades, books, and phonograph records, and also for dusting furniture. This particular attachment is one of the handiest pieces of the vacuuming equipment. When the tube of your tank-type vacuum gets clogged up, it isn't necessary to run a snake wire through it. Just unscrew the tube and then screw it into the other end of the vacuum. The air which blows through it should be sufficiently strong to clear the tube. Be sure to place the end of the tube into a strong paper bag. Wrap the open end of the bag around the tube, holding it firmly to the metal part. This will keep the dirt from scattering all over the room.

### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

**Royal Brownies**  
2 cups Tootsie Fudge 'n Frosting Mix

1/2 cup sifted all purpose flour  
1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
2 eggs (unbeaten)

1/2 cup melted shortening  
1/2 cup coarsely chopped nuts

Mix all of the above ingredients except the nuts in a bowl until thoroughly combined. Add the nuts and place the batter in a greased pan, 8 in. x 8 in. x 2 in. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 25 minutes. After cooling about 15 minutes, cover the top with a frosting made from the remainder of the package of Tootsie Fudge 'n Frosting Mix (1 cup) mixed with 1 tablespoon and 2 teaspoons of hot water. When cool and firm, cut into squares. Yield, 20-25 brownies.

Have you wondered why so many of my recipes call for use of package mix? Well, like so many housekeepers, I, too, have found that they are convenient, speedy and dependable to use. They're easy to carry home, store in the pantry and have on hand for last minute occasions. They save a great deal of measuring and mixing, and are so simple to prepare. Best of all you get a good product—a failure is almost impossible. Remember, those big food companies spend a considerable amount of money on research in order to make their products as safe and delicious as possible. So why not take advantage of their offerings and make cooking more enjoyable?

**A LITTLE OF THIS AND THAT:** Beef juice is an excellent source of food value for the invalid. However, it is very perishable, so don't make a large quantity of it. Prepare it by cutting thick, round steak in cubes, trimming off all of the fat first. Drop the cubes, a few at a time, into the frying pan and broil slightly. Then press out the juice and serve, with a little salt, either cold or warmed in hot water. Don't heat it too much or it will coagulate. Cover a wedge of lemon with cheese cloth when squeezing. It will not only keep the seeds where they belong, but you won't get an eyeful of lemon juice! For that professional look, put jelly, jam, or marmalade between the layers of the next cake you bake. It saves frosting, adds color and zest to the cake. Tomatoes and shelled almonds can be skinned in a twinkling if you blanch them in boiling water for about five minutes. Another speedy way of removing tomato skins is to thrust a fork into them and hold them over the gas flame until the skin becomes dry and taut and finally splits open with a popping noise.

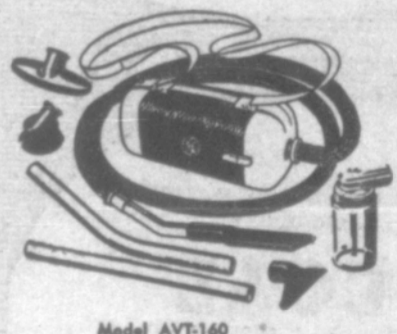

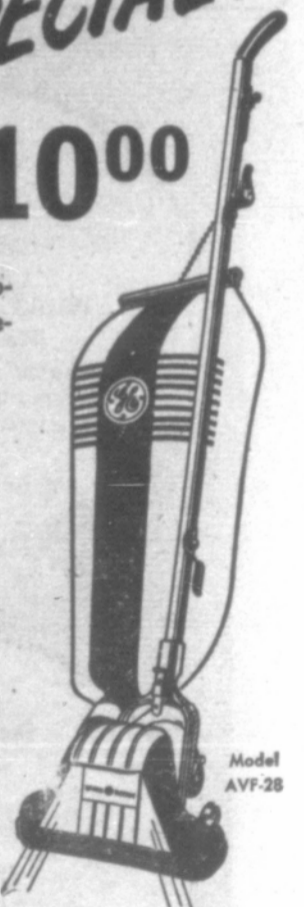
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
