Pepsi-Cola Scholarship
For the past three years the Pepsi-Cola company has offered a scholarship test to outstanding high school seniors all over the United States. The winners of these tests received scholarships which paid for four years of college. Since the inauguration of this program, 490 students have received four-year scholarships and 26 have been winners of the three-year graduate scholarship.

This year the scholarships have been discontinued; however, 446 previous winners are now in college and payments to them will continue for the remainder of their college careers.

The aim of the program has been to select and call attention to talented high school seniors and thus stimulate in all able seniors an interest in further education.

The senior class of Coquille high school had chosen, by popular vote, five seniors whom they believed fit the qualifications specified. The seniors were Warren Jenkins, Joyce Taylor, Virginia

Corrie, Beverly Davis and Mary Gauntlett.
